DIED.

BALDWIN—At Willmar, Minn., on Thursday, May 19, 1898, Mrs. Anna Baldwin, of consumption, aged 46 years, 1 month and 2 days.

The deceased was born in Christiana, Norway, April 17, 1852. She came to this country with her parents in 1864 and located in Northfield, Minn. She afterward moved to Willmar, where she was married to Corydon J. Baldwin, Oct. 7, 1877, at St. Luke's church, by Rev. D. T. Booth.

She leaves a husband and five children as follows: Annie E., aged 13; Clara J., aged 17; Clement J., aged 20; Edward C., aged 23; and Albert N., aged 25. She also leaves two sisters and two brothers, Mrs. Henry Peterson, Willmar; Mrs. Andrew Espellen, Norway Lake; Mr. John A. Johnson, Sioux Falls, S. D.; and Mr. Christian Johnson, Norway Lake.

The funeral was held last Sunday, services being conducted at the Episcopal church by the family pastor, Rev. D. T. Booth, at 2 o'clock p. m. A large concourse of friends followed the remains to their last resting place in Fairview cemetery, where, after the brief burial service of the church, the last sad rites were performed by the members of the Degree of Honor, of which deceased was a member. The floral tributes were many and beautiful.

The sympathy of the community goes out to the family in their sad bereavement, the loss of a dear wife and mother.

PRICE—At her home in Burbank, Sunday, May 15, 1898, Mrs. Katherine Price, aged 86 years.

Mrs. Price was born in Wales in 1812. At 22 years of age she came to America and located first at Philadelphia, where she married in 1840. She was one of the early pioneers of Iowa county, Wis., where she lived until 1868, which year she moved to Burbank, this county. Here she has lived ever since a widow, for her husband died 29 years ago.

She was an intelligent and studious lady and up to three years before her death, when her eyesight failed her, she spent most of her time reading, being particularly fond of good books. She was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church and a devoted Christian.

The children who survive her and mourn the loss of a kind and indulgent mother are Mrs. Grace Jones and John Price, of Burbank; Mrs. Kate Vye, of Appleton; Even Price, of Ellington, S. D.; and Maggie and David, with whom she was staying on

the old homestead.

The funeral occurred at Burbank last Tuesday. Rev. Roach, of Paynesville, though having retired from the ministry, conducted the services at the special request of the deceased.
