**A SAD ACCIDENT.**

**Fireman Herman Brem Very Seriously Injured.**

Yesterday afternoon at about 1:15 o'clock an accident befell Herman Brem which is likely to result in his death. Engine No. 83 had just pulled in an extra freight from the Sioux Falls line, with Engineer Roberts at the throttle and Brem as freeman. They were on their way to the coal shed to take on coal, but when they arrived the fireman was missing. As there was an extra man on board, A. K. Omli, nothing was thought of the absence of the fireman at the time, it being supposed that he had jumped off. On the return, however, the crew was horrified to find the body of Brem lying near the track. He was picked up in an unconscious condition, and upon examination it was found that the skull was fractured and several pieces of bone were impressed upon the brain. Dr. Frost was summoned and the young man was taken to his parents' home, where the surgical work was done and all possible assistance rendered.

Just how the accident occurred is not known, but it is supposed that he was holding himself in readiness to take on coal, and when last seen was on top of the cab. He undoubtedly fell off, striking his head against some hard object with terrific force.

At this writing (Tuesday evening) he is still unconscious and the gravest fears are entertained for his recovery. Herman is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Brem, of the Deutsche restaurant. His pleasant disposition has won him many friends, and he has always been a favorite with his companions.
