#### COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

#### Proceedings of the Board at the Regular Session.

Auditor's Office, January 2nd, A. D. 1899.

The Board of County Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment. All members present.

The bonds of O. Axel Hedin, register of deeds elect, in the sum of \$5000; Axel F. Nordin, judge of probate elect, in the sum of \$1000; George H. Otterness, court commissioner elect, in the sum of \$2000; B. F. Jenness, county surveyor elect, in the sum of \$500; Pascal H. Frye, county attorney elect, in the sum of \$1,000; Charles W. Odell, sheriff elect, in the sum of \$5000, were presented, and referred to the county attorney, who reported the same as correct in form and execution, whereupon said bonds were upon motion accepted and sureties thereon approved.

The bond of Lewis Johnson, as

county auditor, was upon motion fixed at \$5000. The bond of Edward S. Frost, as coroner, was upon motion fixed at \$1000. The bond of Warner L. Noren, as county treasurer, was upon motion fixed at \$50,000.

The bonds of Lewis Johnson, county auditor elect, in the sum of \$5000; Edward S. Frost, coroner elect, in the sum of \$1000; Warner L. Noren, county treasurer elect, in the sum of \$50,000, were presented and referred to the county attorney, who reported the same as correct in form and execution, whereupon said bonds were upon motion accepted and sureties thereon approved.

On motion the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, proceedings have been instituted by injunction upon the complaint of A. H. Sperry to restrain the board of county commissioners of Kandiyohi county from issuing bonds to repay the money loaned from the county road and bridge fund, and to pay orders outstanding and chargeable to the county, all of which has necessarily been drawn for the completion of Bonded Road No. 1 of said county, and

Whereas, by the judgment of this Board, a defense thereto is imperative and deemed necessary and for the interest of the county; now, therefore be it

Resolved, by the Board of County Commissioners of Kandiyohi County, Minnesota, that Samuel Porter, Esq., be and he hereby is appointed special council to take charge of and carry through the defense in said action.
