**MEMORIAL DAY.**

**The Nation's Dead Remembered in an Appropriate Manner.**

**A Large Attendance from all Parts of the County.**

Decoration Day was fittingly observed at Willmar yesterday. The day was windy but otherwise the weather was pleasant and the roads had dried sufficiently from the heavy rains to make marching pleasant. The program as was published was well carried out. The ranks of veterans of the civil war showed an attendance by a number of the surviving members from different parts of the county. The veterans from the late Spanish-American war constituted a new feature of the parade. A good number of the company were in line, and they showed the skill attained by their nine months of drilling by perfect evolutions, performed under the command of Capt. Spicer. Teachers and students of the Seminary were out in force. The children of the public schools with an abundance of flags formed a very pretty picture. Arriving at the park, the procession broke up and the program was begun by a song by the children. Gov. A. E. Rice, Commander of Col. Heg Post, acted as chairman of the day, and made a neat little speech. Referring to Co. D, Mr. Rice stated that it would be the duty of the veterans of the Spanish-American war in the future to have charge of the ceremonies of Decoration Day, when the last survivors of the Civil war would have gone to their long rest. After another song by the children, Prof. H. S. Hilleboe made the address of the day. The professor sustained his reputation as a good speaker, and made a fine oration. He had a strong wind to contend with in making himself heard, but he held the attention of the large crowd remarkably well. Prof. Hilleboe's speech was not merely a succession of patriotic phrases, but his line of thought evinced careful inquiry and gave food for reflection to our patriotic citizens.

The observance of the day as a whole, while simple and unostentatious, was ample in patriotic spirit manifest and a success in carrying out of the arrangements. The attendance both from town and county was perhaps larger than at any previous occasion of this kind at Willmar. Decoration Day appeals to the most noble feelings of the citizen and the increased interest apparently taken in its observance is an encouraging sign of the times.
