DIED.

The sad intelligence reached us last week of the death of Mrs. Johanna Parson, one of the early settlers in the town of Fahluu. The demise occurred at 8:45 a. m., on Monday, Nov. 13th. A severe cold terminating in consumption was the cause of death.

The deceased was 57 years and 11 days of age. She had been a resident of the town of Fahluu ever since 1869. Funeral services were held last Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the Methodist church in the town of Kandiyohi, Rev. A. E. Wahlquist officiating. She leaves a husband and family of four children to mourn her demise, William, Henry and Hattie, of this county, and Mathilda, a resident of Oregon; also two brothers and a sister at River Falls, Wis. The heartfelt sympathy of the community is extended to the bereaved family.

Mrs. Mary Larson Stevens, beloved wife of Jens Larson Stevens, passed away last Thursday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, after a lingering illness of nine weeks from a tumorous growth in the liver. Death came as a great relief from all her suffering, and she was prepared to pass the portals of that land from where no sorrow or suffering ever comes.

Deceased was 64 years of age, having been a resident of the county for the past 19 years. Previous to the removal of the family into the village, they had spent a number of years on their farm, about two miles southwest of Willmar. The deceased and her surviving husband had been blessed with a family of twelve children during their nearly fifty years of married life, nine of which are living. The funeral took place Sunday afternoon at 1 o'clock from the family residence, Rev. T. P. Laugerson, of Hutchinson, a relative of the deceased, officiating. The remains were laid at rest in the family burial lot at Fairview cemetery. A large number of sorrowing friends and relatives were present to pay their last respects to the deceased. The heartfelt sympathy of the community goes out to the husband and family in their bereavement--the loss of a kind wife and mother.
