A number of cases of sickness have been reported in the village recently which were attended by symptoms of smallpox in a very light form. A number of cases were brought to the attention of Dr. Aronhald, the village health officer, yesterday, and he thought it best to communicate with the state board of health concerning the same. Accordingly, Dr. Frederick Leavitt, a reputed expert on smallpox was sent to Atwater last evening and examined the cases in question, and pronounced them smallpox in a very mild form. The places so far quarantined are Martin Olson's where Darwin is the one affected, S. M. Sivertson's where Charles Relf is sick, and also Elmer Earley's where the children have symptoms of the disease. If it is smallpox there are several who have had it and got well without even knowing that they had it. No fear is manifested concerning the cases now reported or the prevalence of the disease, but of course all the necessary precautions have been taken to suppress its spread. The schools will be closed for a couple of weeks, and other gatherings will be called off for a like period.—Atwater Republican Press.

**OBITUARY.**  
The grim reaper has again called in our midst and another of our young men is no more. J. Ferdinand Lofgren passed peacefully away to the land where no sorrow or harm can befall him, at 6:45 p. m. Tuesday of last week. Deceased was a victim of the well known disease, consumption, from which he has suffered since last April. He was at the twin cities for several months receiving treatment from the best doctors, but in vain, returning about a month ago and then thought to be improving, but, however, grew worse until death came as a relief. Ferdinand was the last of a family of seven, his father mother and seven brothers and sisters having died before him. A number of cases of sickness have been reported in the village recently which were attended by symptoms of smallpox in a very light form. In several of the cases the parties have not been so sick as to be confined to the house at all, and have not been attended by a physician. A number of cases were brought to the attention of Dr. Aronhald, the village health officer, yesterday, and he thought it best to communicate with the state board of health concerning the same. Accordingly, Dr. Frederick Leavitt, a reputed expert on smallpox was sent to Atwater last evening and examined the cases in question, and pronounced them smallpox in a very mild form. The places so far quarantined are Martin Olson's where Darwin is the one affected, S. M. Sivertson's where Charles Relf is sick, and also Elmer Earley's where the children have symptoms of the disease. If it is smallpox there are several who have had it and got well without even knowing that they had it. No fear is manifested concerning the cases now reported or the prevalence of the disease, but of course all the necessary precautions have been taken to suppress its spread. The schools will be closed for a couple of weeks, and other gatherings will be called off for a like period.—Atwater Republican Press.
