Republicans Name a City Ticket.

The delegates to the republican city convention met last night and speedily went through the form of nominating their slate. Geo. W. Tyler was nominated for mayor by unanimous vote.

Judge Muller acted as chairman at the second ward caucus and Geo. H. Osterhaus as secretary.

John Williams was nominated for the long term for alderman by acclamation. For the short term, F. H. World declined. O. B. Olson, H. C. Hanson and Ed Sandbo were named.

At the fourth ward caucus J. W. Jones was elected chairman and Nels Swenson secretary.

A large number of independent voters had gathered here with the idea that the caucus was a general affair. But on reflection they decided that to participate in the "Republican" caucus would be the same as to sanction the partisan move.

At the first ward caucus Wm. T. Markhus and Mr. T. Sandbo were nominated for aldermen for two and one year respectively.

The names suggested for aldermen were: Frank Holmberg and N. O. Nelson nominated J. G. Jones, Edick Nelson and Nels Swenson were also named.

In Third Ward S. Peterson presided and Atty. Sam'l Olson was made secretary.

S. S. Glarum and A. J. Ekander were named for the short term of alderman. The ballot resulted in a victory for Ekander by a vote of 17 to 20.
