The dry weather and high wind stirred up so much real estate as to make land viewing anything but pleasant, and the rush was checked until after a rain shall have fallen. It is hard to sell land when it is flying high.

Annual Meeting of City Council.

All members of the new city council were present at the first meeting held last Thursday evening.

The first business was the selection of a city attorney. Applications were in from Attorneys Geo. Muller, Sam'l Olson, Mason W. Spicer and Samuel Porter. The first ballot resulted as follows: Muller, 3; Olson, 3; Spicer, 2. On the second ballot Muller received 5 and Olson 3, and Muller was declared elected.

Nels S. Swenson and F. H. Wold were proposed for auditor. Swenson was elected by a vote of 5 to 3.

Dr. Rains was re-elected health officer over Dr. MacLaughlin by a vote of 7 to 1. M. Jorgenson and Samuel Porter were appointed members of the board of health for one year.

The mayor announced the appointment of the following committees: Streets—Sandbo, Olson, Ekander and Bjornberg.

Finances—Markhus, Williams and Qvale.

Fire Department—Williams, Nelson and Ekander.

Engrossing—Markhus and Qvale.

Mayor Tyler announced the appointment of Martin Sorenson as chief of police and Hans Engelstad as patrolman, and the council ratified the appointments.

The bond of the city treasurer was fixed at \$5,000.

The official oaths and bonds of the justices and city officials were approved and filed.

The clerk was authorized to purchase necessary justice dockets.

Salaries were fixed as follows: assessor, \$2 a day; policemen, \$50 a month; health officer, \$50 for year; auditor, \$75 for year; treasurer, \$75 a year; city attorney, \$250 for the year; clerk, \$25 a month.

The bond of the clerk was fixed at \$1,000.

Alderman Qvale offered the following resolution and moved its adoption:

That the auditor shall immediately after assuming his office examine and check up the books of the treasurer and the clerk and he shall make out a correct and detailed statement of the affairs of the city, including all indebtedness of every description outstanding against the city. The amount of warrants outstanding, the amount of bills allowed by the council and still remaining unpaid. He shall ascertain as nearly as possible all indebtedness or bills of every kind and nature contracted by the city which have as yet not been presented to the council or acted upon and remaining outstanding against the city, and forthwith present such statement and report to the council. The statement shall also show the total bonded indebtedness outstanding and the rate of interest said bonds bear, also the amount when the bonds and interest thereon become due and payable and the total amount of liabilities and resources of the city. He shall also in conjunction with the clerk and the water and light commissioners take an inventory of all real estate and other properties and supplies of every description belonging to the city the value of which shall also be given in said statement.

A large objection as to whether such a procedure was agreeable to the city charter was made and referred to the city attorney. The resolution was adopted without a dissenting vote.

The engrossing committee and city attorney were directed to draw up an ordinance prescribing rules governing the council.

It was decided that the mayor should appoint a supervisor of the poor, and Mayor Tyler at once appointed John Williams as such supervisor.

Presbyterian Meeting. The semi-annual session of the Presbyterian church of St. Cloud assembled at the Presbyterian church of this place on Tuesday afternoon with a larger attendance than ever before in this district. The following pastors and elders were in attendance:

Dr. R. N. Adams, D. D., of Minneapolis, superintendent of missions in Minnesota, and Rev. E. A. Driscoll, representing Macalester college were also present.

The session was opened with devotional exercises led by Rev. R. Drysdale of New London, after which came the reports from the various churches by pastors and elders. Church finances was the subject of an address by Rev. T. F. M. Clark of Maynard, and the subject was ably handled. The afternoon session was closed with an address by McDonald of Willmar.

Popular meetings were held Tuesday evening, the first being a song service, conducted by Thos. Sooton, Sunday school missionary. This was followed by the Moderator's sermon which was given by Rev. C. B. Latimer of Wheaton, his subject being "Inspiration." The sacrament of the Lord's Supper was then observed, Rev. J. S. Boyd and Rev. T. F. M. Clark officiating. The evening session closed with the organization of the Presbytery. Rev. J. S. Handyside was chosen Moderator, and Dr. Satterlee of Kerkhoven, temporary clerk.

A large portion of Wednesday was devoted to the business of the Presbytery. Popular meetings were held beginning at three o'clock, being opened by a very able address by Rev. S. Stone of Litchfield on the subject, "Revivals." The speaker pointed out very plainly the causes which have resulted in the lack of interest in church work. This address was followed by a short address by Rev. Handyside on the subject, "Power." Popular meetings were also held in the evening when addresses were made by Rev. T. M. Findley and Rev. E. V. Campbell. All the meetings were very interesting, and during the business sessions the work was transacted with great promptness. The visitors expressed themselves as being very highly pleased with their sojourn here and especially with the manner in which they had been entertained.—Atwater Republican Press.
