

**Kandiyoohi Co. Shows up Well.**

Minnesota's contribution to the McKinley memorial fund has just been published. The state contributes a total of \$8,889.48. In the list of eighty counties we notice that Kandiyoohi is exceeded by only five counties in the amount of contribution, her share being \$187.34. The five counties are Hennepin, \$2,126.79; Rice, \$311.23; Freeborn, \$304.07; Ramsey, \$243.38; Carver, \$191.72. Duluth's contribution is given independent of that by the county, St. Louis, which would place Kandiyoohi seventh on the list. An additional contribution of \$2.00 received from the Spicer Debating Club makes the correct total for Kandiyoohi county \$189.34.

EDITOR TRIBUNE: We have had the principles of Prohibition presented to us in a masterly manner by J. J. Craig, representative of the state Prohibition Committee, both in the grove at Srea May 28, and also in our grove on Memorial day. At Srea he addressed the annual picnic of the Lutheran church, and the social features, thanks to Pastor Lundberg and other kind friends, was very enjoyable. Mr. Craig is an able speaker and does credit to the party he represents. His statements are not only convincing but logical from beginning to end. He says that, "the liquor traffic is protected by the church, and that it is the vote of the Christian people that is perpetrating it, and that God will hold every Christian man responsible for every vote cast legalizing the traffic and protecting the saloon." One of our representative churches has voiced the sentiment, and it has travelled around the world and back again, that "the liquor traffic cannot be legalized without sin," and I have faith enough in the rest of the churches to believe that they would say the same. Are we as churches and as Christians consistent in this matter? We were glad to have Rev. Hill with us who, after offering prayer, made a speech full of patriotism, also Mr. T. H. **Class of Ten Graduated from Willmar High School Last Thursday.**

Ten more graduates have been added to the already large list which the Willmar High school has had the honor of sending out from that educational institution. On last Thursday evening the closing exercises of commencement week were held at the opera house in the presence of fully as large an audience as any on previous like occasions. With the decorations of potted plants and flowers and the class colors of pale and dark blue, the scene was a very pretty one. The motto in class colors, "In Portu," was gracefully suspended over the stage. The class occupied a prominent position on the stage, being seated in a semi-circle, and directly back of it was the High school faculty, Supt. Kilgore, Miss Updyke, Miss Gjems and Prof. Haig, who had worked faithfully through the year and were sharing the honors with the class. The Board of Education, the members of which, are Dr. C. Johnson, O. R. Berkness, I. T. Cramer, Swan Anderson and H. S. Peterson, also occupied seats in the rear of the stage.
