Willmar Cold Storage Plant to be Erected at Once on the Old Robbins Property. A cold storage house with a creamery in conjunction is now an assured thing in this city. Last week Messrs. Holt and Finseth completed negotiations for the purchase of part of the J. S. Robbins property at the east end of Litchfield avenue, which borders on the Great Northern right of way.

The creamery which the gentlemen propose to run can be operated on a more economical basis. They will engage in the manufacture of ice cream, as well as cheese and the very best grade of butter.

COMES THROUGH WILLMAR.

President Roosevelt's Special Train To Pass Through Willmar September 26th.

According to the Pioneer Press, the following is the itinerary for the president's trip through Minnesota on his way to Sioux City, Iowa: President Roosevelt's special train will arrive in St. Paul over the Milwaukee line as the second section of the fast mail at 2:45 Thursday afternoon, Sept. 25.

The trip through the west will take two weeks and will be the most extensive taken by President Roosevelt. Postmaster General Payne will accompany the president to Milwaukee, Secretary Shaw will join him at St. Paul and accompany him through Northwestern Iowa, and Secretary Wilson will accompany him through Central Iowa on the return trip.
