





### LESSON IN AMERICAN HISTORY IN PUZZLE



THE ESCAPE FROM FORT LE BOEUF. Find Enigma Price. One of the most miraculous escapes of the many noted in the history of the English garrisons in Chief Pontiac's war in 1763 was that from Fort Le Boeuf. A force of more than 200 Indians stealthily surrounded the fort which was defended by Ensign Price and but 12 men. For some hours the little garrison kept the Indians at bay, but during the darkness the savages succeeded in setting fire to the blockhouse which it was impossible to extinguish. While the Indians were anticipating the terrible death of the defenders on one side of the fort, they had chopped a hole in the blockhouse on the other side, and through this all escaped. A part of the number reached Fort Pitt in safety, but some of them died of hunger in the forest.
