Charles Erik Bodin was born in Kopparsbergs Län, Dalarna, Sweden, on March 10, 1864. In 1887 he was united in marriage with Christina Anderson. Two years later the family emigrated to America, coming to this county. They spent three years in the vicinity of Atwater, after which they went to Chippewa county and settled on a farm.
Deceased leaves a wife and a ten-year-old son to mourn his untimely death. One child had died in infancy. Bodin was a genial, goodnatured man, who had a host of friends in the eastern part of the county, and they extend their heartfelt sympathy to the bereaved wife and child.

Some suggestions gleaned from Printers Ink, a recognized authority on advertising.

1. Good advertising is a great dividend paying investment.
 2. Don't let your business die for lack of nourishment. Advertise!
 3. Successful advertising not only pays the advertiser but those who do the buying as well.
 4. Advertisers need not be afraid of words. These are all right when used properly. It was by use of words that Othello won Desdemona, and it was the eloquence of Marc Anthony which stirred the populace to wrath, against brutes and the rest. It is not the use of words which is to be guarded against, but the misuse of them.
 5. An advertising campaign of reasonable magnitude is in itself an indication of quality in the commodity. The public has learned to recognize this. "That must be a good article, for I see it advertised everywhere" is a common remark nowadays. It is born of the knowledge that advertising is more or less costly, and that it cannot be used profitably to exploit inferior goods. The public has learned that there is safety in buying advertised articles, and the fact gives a certain standing to every new article marketed through advertising.

Bituminous Miners' Increase.
The old wage scale between the bituminous miners and operators of nearly twenty states expired March 31. The 1902 agreement will continue in several western and southern states until June or July. In Illinois, Ohio, Iowa, Kentucky, Pennsylvania and other states where the miners and operators have agreed the new scale is in force.
A few figures compiled by Secretary Wilson show that the bituminous miners as a result of the national and state conventions will this year receive an aggregate increase of \$19,437,000 in wages over last year.

HORTICULTURE AT FAIR

A Fine Exhibit of Minnesota Fruit.

Advance reports from the fruit growers of the state indicate that the horticultural exhibit at the coming Minnesota State Fair will be perhaps the finest ever seen on the fair grounds. It is regarded as a good year for apples in this section, while other fruits if not the very best condition, are at least of fairly good quality and plentiful in quantity. This year the horticultural exhibit will occupy a part of the great agricultural hall but it is hoped within a year or so to have a building for the exclusive use of the fruit growers. Only a few years ago both agricultural and horticultural exhibits occupied a comparatively small building; now the fair has grown so enormously that both departments are much crowded in the great agricultural building, nearly 250 feet square.
The fruit display is one of the divisions at the fair which is exclusively Minnesotan. No fruit is displayed which is not grown within the borders of the state. This makes the department of special importance as showing to visitors from other places what Minnesota can do in such an important branch as horticulture. In fact it has been noticed that people from other states east and south have been very much impressed with the horticultural exhibits of years past.
The State Fair will this year open on August 31st and the management guarantees that the fruit department as well as all other divisions of the fair will be in complete order at nine o'clock on the morning of the opening day. Half fare rates have been made on all railroads.
