

MUST ATTEND WHOLEYEAR

Children Are Required to Go to School During Entire Time School is in Session.

Pupils between eight and sixteen years in public schools of Minnesota must attend school the entire time that the schools in the districts in which they live are in session...

Under an old law on compulsory education pupils were required to attend twelve weeks, of which six had to be in succession.

Mr. Donahower holds that those provisions in the old law which are in conflict with provisions in the new laws are repealed...

Pupils will be excused only when the following is shown to the school board in the district in which the parent or guardian resides:

That such parent, guardian or other person having control is not able by reason of poverty to clothe the child properly.

That the child's bodily or mental condition is such as to prevent his attendance at school or application to study for the required period.

That the child is taught at home in the branches of study which are usually taught at the public schools, subject to the same examination as other pupils of the district are.

That the child has already acquired the ordinary branches required by law.

That the child is actually engaged in some useful occupation, employment or service permitted by law.

In addition to proving himself a successful salesman of his spurious goods, it was as an ensnarer of fond affections that he shone to best advantage. Wherever he went, this smooth Lothario found some trusting fair one who was more than willing to confine her happiness to his keeping.

Gilmore will be remembered as the criminal who was taken through Willmar by the sheriff from Fergus Falls, to be lodged in the Otter Tail county jail. He was brought from Granite Falls, where he had been held pending the arrival of the authorities.

PRIZE FOR BUTTERMAKERS

Valuable Silver Cups Will Be Awarded to the Three Making the Highest Score in State Contest.

Valuable silver cups will be awarded to the three buttermakers who make the highest average in the twelve month butter scoring contest conducted by the state dairy and food commission.

The first prize, a cup valued at \$75, will be presented by Gov. Van Sant and will be known as the Van Sant cup. The second cup is valued at \$50 and the third at \$25.

W. W. P. McConnell, state dairy and food commissioner, yesterday sent circulars to the 130 butter makers who took part in the first butter scoring test, informing them that the next test will be held Tuesday, December 8.

The circular follows: "The second scoring of butter in the state educational contest will take place on Tuesday, December 8, 1903, and you are therefore requested to have your butter here on Monday, December 7."

"I heartily congratulate all those who participated in the November contest, as the average score of the 130 samples competing was 93. It was certainly a praiseworthy beginning, and we trust there will be constant and earnest effort among you all to win the highest laurels in these tests.

New men came to the front in the first contest. First place was taken by Alf ed Schroeder of Lafayette, Nicollet county, whose sample scored 98. James Sorenson of Lyndale, Hennepin county, came second with a score of 97, and J. O. Dybervick of Cannon Falls took third prize, scoring 97.

NO CHECK ON DISEASE

State Board of Health Finds Thirty Smallpox Cases in Green Lake Town not Quarantined.

An epidemic of small pox in Green Lake township, Kandiyohi county, says the St. Paul Pioneer Press, has been reported to the state board of health. In the last two or three months thirty-five cases have been reported to the board from that locality.

The state board immediately ordered the cases quarantined and the houses disinfected where the patients had recovered. The residents of the townships were warned that those that contracted the disease willfully are liable to a fine not exceeding \$100 or imprisonment for thirty days.

Of the thirty-five cases reported by Mr. Beckman ten were under ten years of age and twenty between ten and twenty. Two were between twenty and thirty; one between thirty and forty; and two between forty and fifty.

Besides thirty-two old cases in Kandiyohi county, thirteen new cases were reported to the board for the week ending Nov. 16. They are: Kandiyohi county Green Lake township, 5; St. Cloud 2; Motley 2; New York Mills, 1; Becker township, Cass county, 1; Bemidji, 1.
