Items Gleaned from Our Exchanges

Atwater Republican Press:

When it reached the corner near the mill Mr. Nelson attempted to stop it, and in his endeavor the horse and buggy ran over him. He was knocked down and badly bruised, but fortunately without more serious results.

The marriage of Chester Roy Strong and Miss Helen Christine Ruden occurred at St. Paul on Wednesday last week. The ceremony was performed by the Episcopal minister, Rev. Pope, and was witnessed by a few relatives and friends. We understand the newly married couple will make this place their home for a few months, and will then go to Canada.

Miss Frances L. Wheeler, formerly of this village, but now of Caron, Sask., has chosen Wednesday, Aug. 29th, as the date of her marriage to Mr. Olof Holm of Caron. The wedding will take place at the Wicklow farm, Wheelerville, Sask., the home of her father, Mr. T. B. Wheeler.

Considerable stock thrashing has been done in this vicinity, and the yield seems to vary somewhat. Southeast of the village reports brought in show a yield of from 13 to 16 bushels of wheat to the acre. It is reported that Robert Bergstrom living north of town had one field that went 20 bushels to the acre, but that was the best he had. Not much of the wheat will grade better than No. 2, and much of it will go below that.
