A FATAL ACCIDENT

Young Son of August Broman is Fatally Crushed Under Wheels of a Thrasher.

One of the saddest accidents that has taken place in this vicinity in many a month occurred last Saturday evening at the home of Aug. Broman, in Lake Ellsabeth, when Vernon Lester, the 10-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Broman, met his death by being run over by a thrashing machine. The thrasher had just finished at C. E. Johnson's and was moving over to Mr. Broman's after dark. They had to move across the field, and Mr. Broman, accompanied by the little boy above named, took the lantern and went out to guide them across the field. While crossing the field Vernon left his father and went back to the machine. It is not known whether or not he climbed into the straw cart, but it is supposed he was hanging on to it. When they reached the orchard at the Broman residence Mr. Broman heard some one cry out, and thinking at once that some accident had occurred he hurried back to the machine and arrived there just as the hind wheel of the separator had passed over his son. Just how the accident happened is not known, but it is thought that he was hanging onto the straw cart, and that he fell off. The separator was following close behind, and it is probable that the front wheel passed over him also. He was taken to the house and the doctor summoned as speedily as possible, but nothing could be done to save his life. One of the thigh bones was broken, the skull was injured, as was also his back, and it is possible there were internal injuries. The brave little sufferer remained conscious for about two hours after the accident and was able to answer questions. He finally became unconscious and soon passed away, his death occurring about two and a half hours after the accident. The funeral was held on Tuesday, being conducted by Rev. Lindstrom of the Methodist church. Services were held at the home beginning at 10 o'clock, and later at the church in Atwater. The floral tributes were many and beautiful. The remains were interred in the cemetery south of the village.—Atwater Republican Press.

Death in Colfax.

Mrs. Aug. J. Lundgren died at her home in Colfax Tuesday evening at about 8:45 o'clock from heart disease, after being a sufferer for a number of years. The funeral will be held Saturday at the home at 1 o'clock p. m., and the remains interred in the Colfax cemetery.

Amanda Sofia Lundgren was born in Vastergotland, Sweden, Nov. 12, 1857, where she resided with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Newlin, until 1863, when they came to this country and settled in Carver county. In 1865 they took a homestead three miles west of New London, where she resided until 1884, when she was united in marriage with Aug. J. Lundgren of Colfax, where she resided until the end came. She leaves a husband and one daughter, Ella, and one sister and two brothers to mourn her loss: Mrs. P. Nordstedt, John Newlin of Lake Andrew and Emil Newlin, who resides on the old homestead in this town. They will have the sympathy of all who know them in their bereavement.—New London Times.

Heard the Great Singer.

Aged Sufferer Passes Away.

Mrs. Christina Nelson, wife of Nels Nelson of town of Mamre, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Aug. Schollin, in this city, last Friday evening at 9:40 o'clock. She had been suffering with rheumatism for about twenty years, and had been confined to her bed most of that time. Towards the last dropsy also added to her sufferings, and death came as a welcome relief.

Funeral services were held at the Schollin residence on Monday forenoon at 10:30 o'clock. Rev. G. Peterson preached an impressive funeral sermon and also read the services usually given at the grave, as he had to go away for several days and could not go to the burial place. The remains were taken to Mamre on Tuesday forenoon and buried in the Mamre cemetery.

Christine (Johnson) Nelson was born in Griefvan, Jerna parish, Dalarna, Sweden, Oct. 6, 1829, and had thus reached the advanced age of 77 years, one month and 10 days in 1858 she was married to Nels Nelson, who survives her. Mrs. Nelson came to this country in the seventies and settled on a farm in section six, town of Mamre. In 1880 the family followed him. During her long illness Mrs. Nelson spent part of the time at her home and part with Mrs. Schollin. The last four weeks of her life were spent with the daughter mentioned. Five children survive her, namely: Mrs. Christine Johnson, wife of O. P. Johnson of Stockholm, S. D.; Mrs. Anna Schollin, wife of Aug. Schollin of Minneapolis; Nels and Andrew Nelson of Minneapolis; and John Nelson of Aitkin, Minn. All but the last mentioned were present at the funeral. John's absence was caused by the sad fact that his eyesight, which has been failing for some time, has lately been totally lost.

The marriage was a quiet affair and was followed by a reception given in the apartments of the bride in the Dr. Johnson block, where a few relatives and intimate friends participated in a wedding supper. The rooms were prettily decorated with cut flowers. Both the bride and groom are well known in Willmar and vicinity. The bride has for a number of years conducted a dressmaking establishment in the city and the groom until about five years ago was a resident of this country. He is now located on a farm near Estevan, where they place the happy pair expect to leave this evening to make their future home. Mr. Hildahl has real estate interests in Canada and makes Estevan his headquarters part of the year. Many friends of the bridal pair in this city will extend hearty congratulations and wish them a long and happy life in their new relationship.
