



Alfalfa Pays \$96 An Acre

Mr. L. C. Puckett raised alfalfa last year on his farm near Hidalgo, Texas. He cut it eight times, made a ton to the acre each cutting, and sold it for \$12 a ton. Thus each acre earned \$96 in a year. That can be done in the Gulf Coast Country because there is so little cold weather that alfalfa grows almost fifty-two weeks in the year and can be cut every six weeks.

Think what climate like this means to the truck farmer. He can raise tomatoes in Midwinter—market tender vegetables in the early Spring when the price is highest. There he is not limited to one crop a year but can raise two and even three crops. Think also of the delight of living in a country which has perfect Winters and Summers made comfortable by the cool breezes from the Gulf.

If you will write Mr. Puckett at Hidalgo, Texas, he will tell you exactly what he thinks of the country and how he is succeeding.

Wouldn't you like to have a small farm in the Gulf Coast Country where success does not depend on uncertain weather with irregular rainfall?

Now the land is cheap and you can get it on easy terms. Twenty acres will cost you about \$500. The cost of clearing it is about \$5 an acre. The cost of water for irrigation varies. You may want an artesian well of your own; you may get water from some river; or you may get it from your neighbor. But the cost is not great, and those who have tried it have netted from the first crop a sum which has paid all expenses and left a good surplus.

Prize Winners in Farm Contest.
Two Kandiyohi county farmers have been placed on the honor roll by J. J. Hill in his prize contest which has just closed. They are the D. N. Tallman farm of Willmar and the Eddy farm of Whitefield. The former secured the first prize of \$300 for the best kept farm and the third prize, \$75, is awarded to the Eddy farm. The prizes were awarded last week. These prizes were offered for the best kept farms in the different congressional districts. Prof. Thomas Shaw of Minneapolis was chairman of the judges and had been making personal visits to the different farms. The contest was instituted by Mr. Hill last spring.
