## THE CITY COUNCIL

### Proceedings at Adjourned Session Held Monday Evening of This Week.

Council Chambers, Library Building, Willmar, Minn., Jan. 21, 1907.

Adjourned meeting of the City Council.

On roll call there were present Mayor Qvale, Aldermen Christianson, Tallman, Gratz, Johnson, Pinney, Holt and Strand, 8; Absent, Alderman Holmberg, 1.

Moved and seconded that the ordinance entitled "An Ordinance Authorizing the Issuance of the Bonds of the City of Willmar for the purpose of Purchasing a Site and Erecting Thereon a City Hall and Building for the Safe Keeping of the Fire Apparatus of the said City" be given its second reading. The said ordinance was then read.

On motion the ordinance authorizing the issuance and sale of certificates of indebtedness in anticipation of the collection of taxes levied for year A. D. 1906 for and account of the General Fund" be given its second reading. The said ordinance was then read.

A petition was presented signed by Andrew Larson and others asking for the construction of a sewer in First Ward to be built along the following streets, viz.: Commencing at the center of Ella avenue where the east end of said avenue intersects the waters of Foot Lake, and continuing thence westerly along the center of said avenue to the center of the junction of said avenue and Eleventh street, thence southerly and along the center of Eleventh street to the center of said Eleventh street and Gorton avenue, and there terminating.

On motion the said petition was referred to the Street Committee.

Alderman Holt offered the following resolution which was unanimously adopted.

#### RESOLUTION.

Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Willmar that the City Clerk be and he is hereby authorized to issue a warrant against the Water and Light Fund for six hundred and twenty-five (\$625.00) Dollars, in favor of the Kandiyohi County Bank, in payment of Funding Bonds Coupons.

Alderman Holt offered the following resolution which was unanimously adopted.

#### RESOLUTION.

Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Willmar that the City Clerk be and he is hereby authorized to issue a warrant against the Water and Light Fund for \$25.00 and a warrant against the General Fund for \$75.00 both in favor of the Bank of Willmar, in payment for interest coupons due January 1st, 1907, on Funding Bonds of said City.

Constable was presented. On motion the same was referred to the City Attorney.

The matter of enforcing the dog tax ordinance was then considered. Alderman Johnson offered the following resolution which was unanimously adopted.

RESOLUTION. Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Willmar that all the owners of dogs running at large in the City of Willmar upon which a license has not been paid for the season of 1906 and are not wearing a collar with a registered number thereon as prescribed by ordinance, be given 15 days from the passage of this resolution and that due notice be given in the official paper to secure such license and upon the expiration of 15 days all dogs running at large without said collar exhibiting said license be impounded for a period of 24 hours, and if the owner of said dogs do not call in the mean time and pay said license and impounding fee and place a collar upon the dog with tag thereon the Chief Police is hereby authorized to kill all such dogs.

The City Attorney reported that he found the Bond of Henry Stenson, Constable, correct in form and execution.

On motion the said bond was accepted and approved.

The Street Committee reported in the matter of petition of Andrew L. Larson and others for the construction of a sewer along Ella avenue and 11th street that said petition had been signed by the required number of property owners along the route of the proposed sewer and said Committee recommended that said petition be granted and that the sewer be constructed as asked for in the said petition.

Moved and seconded that the report of the Street Committee in the matter of petition of Andrew Larson and others for the construction of sewer petition be accepted. Carried.

Alderman Tallman offered the following resolution which was unanimously adopted.

#### RESOLUTION.

Whereas, Andrew Larson and others have presented to the City Council of the City of Willmar a duly verified petition in writing praying for the construction of a sewer in the said City along the following route, to wit: commencing at the intersection of Ella avenue with the waters of Foot Lake in said City and continuing thence in a westerly direction and along the center of Ella avenue to the center of the junction of Ella avenue and Eleventh street, thence in a southerly direction and along the center of Eleventh street to the center of Eleventh street and Gorton avenue, and there terminating;

And Whereas, the said petition has been referred to the street committee of said City and the said committee has recommended that the prayer of the said petition be granted, and that the said improvement be made and the said sewer be laid and constructed as in the said petition asked for, and have estimated the cost of the said

proposed improvement at the sum of \$1500.00;

And whereas, it appears upon the face of the said petition that the requisite number of the owners owning property fronting upon the route of the said sewer and whose property will be assessed for the said proposed sewer have duly signed the said petition;

Resolved, that the City of Willmar hereby declares its purpose and intention to make said improvement and to cause the said proposed sewer to be constructed as in said petition asked for, and further hereby declares its intention and purpose to assess the property fronting and abutting upon said proposed sewer to be assessed for the cost and expense of constructing the said proposed sewer.

Resolved Further, that the Council will on the 11th day of February, A. D. 1907, at the hour of eight o'clock in the afternoon of that day, and at the Council Chambers in said City, hear and determine said petition and at that time and place all persons interested in the said matter may appear and be heard.

Resolved Further, that the City Clerk is hereby directed to cause notice of such hearing to be published as provided by the Charter of said City.

Spicer Specials. The annual meeting of the Swedish Lutheran church of Spicer was held last Tuesday afternoon. The following officers were elected: Chairman, Rev. A. F. Eastlund; trustees, Mr. Samuelson, John Nordin and William Peterson; deacons, F. O. Swanson, Adolph Norman and John Nordes; auditors, Nels Boreen, John Nordes and Adolph Norman; janitor, A. Samuelson; organist, Mrs. F. O. Swanson; assistant organist, Alma Samuelson.

It was decided that the congregation be incorporated. The name of the congregation is to be The Swedish Evangelical Lutheran church of Spicer, Minn. Rev. A. F.
