DEATH IN ROSELAND

Fred Anderstrom Passed From Scenes of This Life Monday.

Last Monday night at 1:30 o'clock at the home in town of Roseland, occurred the death of a good man and respected citizen, Fred Anderstrom. Deceased had been a sufferer from lung trouble for many years, but death came suddenly, as he was confined to his bed for only two days. Fred Anderstrom was born July 18, 1864, at Gagnef, Sweden, and had thus attained the age of 42 years, 10 months and 15 days. Twenty years ago he came to America, coming to the home of his brother Peter Anderstrom of East Lake Lillian, where he remained until 1901, when he removed to section 1, Roseland. The same year he was married to Mrs. Christine Borg. Besides the sorrowing wife he leaves to mourn his early death a brother, Peter Anderstrom of East Lake Lillian; a niece, Mrs. Hilda Hanson of Whitefield; two sisters and a number of other relatives in Sweden. The widow has the sympathy of a large circle of friends in her affliction.

The funeral will occur on Sunday forenoon at 10:30 from the home and the remains will be taken to the Fahlun Baptist church, where the funeral sermon will be preached by Rev. Anton Nelson of Lake Elizabeth. Interment will take place in the cemetery adjoining the church.

OBITUARY

The grim reaper of death has again visited the home of an old citizen of Willmar. Mrs. Greta Sundling, wife of August Sundling in Second ward, died last Saturday night. She has been ailing for seven years or more with asthma and at times has been seriously ill, but she appeared to be quite well last Saturday and expected to take a trip to New London to visit friends this week. She retired as usual Saturday night, but in the morning she was found dead in bed. The doctor who was summoned expressed the opinion that she had passed away early in the night.

Mrs. Greta (Forsberg) Sundling was born Aug. 18, 1831, at Präst-Åsen, Gestrikland, Sweden. She was married to August Sundling about 36 years ago and they made their first home at Kilafors, Hel-singland, in 1882, arriving in Willmar May 28 of that year, since which time they have resided here.

Three children were born to them of which one daughter died in infancy. She is mourned by her husband and two sons—Emanuel Sundling, living at St. Cloud, and Adolph Sundling, living at home; also one brother, Anders Forsberg of Lake Elizabeth. The sorrowing

The funeral occurs this afternoon at two o'clock. Services will be held at the Mission church and Rev. Theo F. Paulson will officiate. The interment takes place at Fairview cemetery.


