JOHN QUINCY ADAMS AND A WESTERN MILLIONAIRE

CHARLES F. ADAMS, a descendant of John Quincy Adams, lives on Massachusetts avenue in a house formerly occupied by Bishop Hurst. His brother, Henry Adams, has a home next to that of John Hay. You will find descendants of the second president of the United States all over the union, and the smaller number of them hear the name of Adams. It is a prolific family and it is a standing contradiction to the statement that all of the old New England families of great prominence have died out. Over in the "Whispering Gallery" at the capitol, which, by the way, is nothing more or less than the old house of representatives, there is a little piece of metal set in one of the square blocks of the marble flooring and on it are these words: "John Quincy Adams.
