The Petitioners for the Lake Lillian Ditch Appeal From the Holding of Judge Qvale.

Atty. Chas. Johnson of this city and March of Litchfield, who represent the petitioners for the Lake Lillian ditch, perfected the arrangements for an appeal last week to the supreme court from Judge Qvale's order restraining the contractor of said ditch from touching Big Kandiyohi lake or the natural inlet to the same. It will be remembered that Judge Qvale withdrew his order to enable the auditors to let the contract on the favorable terms offered, with the reservation, however, that he would consider at any time later objections made to any excavation that might tend to lower the natural water level of the lakes. The action taken to bring the matter before the supreme court is to remove it from the jurisdiction of Judge Qvale and permit the work to go on according to the specifications of the ditch.
