PRESIDENT SPICER'S OPENING ADDRESS

Remarks Made at the Opening of the New Auditorium Last Wednesday Afternoon.

"We have assembled at this hour which marks the opening of our Second Annual Chautauqua Assembly, and I am sure this gathering is a good representation of the people who do things; people who are willing to admit that there is something more in life than the cares and responsibilities which ordinarily surround us; people who are fairly entitled to say that living is preferable to making a living, and who enter into the spirit of Chautauqua work with the interest of non-partisan pleasure.

"We have gathered here with the idea that this Assembly will afford to each of us pleasures which cannot be obtained in any other manner. We come here for instruction, combined with recreation and all of the healthful influences of outdoor life.

"There is no institution which is so purely American as the Chautauqua. There is no institution which has so thoroughly appealed to the right thinking American people as these outdoor assemblies where we all come imbued with the feeling of freedom and independence, prompted by our loyalty of thought and action and inspired by the motives which augur better for the future of our great Republic and the preservation of those inalienable rights of citizenship which mark our progress and stimulate our national development.

"We are apt to overlook those things which are near to us and forget that we owe a duty to ourselves to develop a capacity for the enjoyment of those things which have been given to us, and certainly the least of these is not our health, comfort or happiness.

"This Chautauqua Assembly was organized to promote that branch of education and recreation commonly called Chautauqua Work, and its fundamental idea is to encourage all things which may be essential and necessary to right living; but which at all times should be non-partisan and non-sectarian in character.

"The scope of influence of these gatherings we do not expect, and do not wish, to confine to the immediate territory of this village or of this county. The shores of Green Lake afford the ideal place for outdoor life and this location was selected as the logical site for an Assembly which should offer its advantages to the people of Central Minnesota.


