A special Excursion train will leave St. Paul Tuesday evening October 6th, 1908 via Granite Falls, Minn. for



Mr. A. J. Abbott of Willmar township brought in some fine samples of millet, with specimens of which the art exhibit and the ladies' department of the fair will be decorated.

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
