Two citizens of this county have it now in their power to perform a rare service to the whole community. These citizens are Messrs. F. H. Harris of Spicer and Henry Stene of Atwater.

These gentlemen are planning to plat the east shore of Green Lake, along the historic beach of the Irving townsite, and sell lots for summer dwellers on the lake. At his own expense Mr. Stene is now having a road constructed from Harrison township to the lake in order to shorten the distance to the lake from Atwater.

The beauty of Green Lake to the visitor and enjoyment of the lake by the public has been marred by every platting of lake lots so far made at Green Lake. This by reason of placing the public road outside the lots instead of on the lake shore. As a result those driving around the lake are alike shut off from the lake and a front view of the summer homes. Instead of enjoying the view of the beautiful lake on one side and beautiful front yards on the other, the public may now occasionally get a view of the lake from behind barns and out houses.

Whenever a new plat has been made the influence of the people owning the old beaches is thrown to have the new addition laid out in the same absurd fashion.

The Irving beach is one of the most beautiful on the lake. If the proprietors will reverse the order and make the public driveway on the lake shore they will not only make their additions a great success, but will by their example cause a change of sentiment that may lead to an improvement on other places along the lake shore.

The report of the secretary and treasurer showed that the company's debt had been reduced by \$1028 during the past year, and it was decided to have it further reduced by an assessment of \$10 on each stockholder. The rent of the phones was left at \$12 per year, payable semi-annually in advance. The Board of Directors met after the annual meeting and elected officers as follows: President, J. Ed Nelson; vice president, H. B. Eddy; secretary and manager, E. R. Rasmussen; treasurer, F. G. Handy.
