COURT IN SESSION TWO DAYS

Uneventful Court Grind. Disposition of Cases. Court Adjourns for One Week.

The spring term of the district court was in session Monday and yesterday, and the cases on the calendar were disposed of as follows: William F. Toensing, et al, appellants, vs. F. J. Toensing as executor, respondent; set for July 6, when court will reconvene. J. S. Robbins and I. I. Berg vs. City of Willmar; to be tried out of term before Judge Powers upon ten days notice by either party. James Metcalf et al vs. New London Milling Co.; dismissed by plaintiff. In the matter of the application of Madeline I. Minton for the vacation of portions of the plat of Fourth Railroad addition to the City of Willmar; set for July 6. State of Minnesota vs. Samuel Porter; case involving liability of the city to pay benefit in the sum of \$6000 assessed against it by the viewers of county ditch; to be heard before Judge Qvale in chambers on July 27 at 2 p. m. T. A. Tierney vs. Johanna Defoe. Plaintiff sued to recover \$384 which he claimed was due him for digging a well for the defendant. It developed during the trial that Mrs. Defoe had expressly stipulated that she would pay for the work only if water was found above a certain level. When almost the 400 foot level was reached Mrs. Defoe refused Mr. Tierney to proceed any further, claiming she did not want a deep-water supply. The jury returned a verdict for the defendant, so Mr. Tierney will receive nothing for his work. He will also have to pay the costs of the action. A. B. Thorson vs. New London Milling Co.; verdict returned in favor of plaintiff in the sum of 122.50. There was only one case on the criminal calendar, that of the City of Willmar vs. Tinius Olson for pigging. The case was dismissed on motion of the city upon the payment by the defendant of the costs, amounting to \$19.89. Indian Scholars go Thru.
