PROPOSED CHARTER AMENDMENTS. The Following Amendments to the Charter of the City of Willmar, Minnesota, have been prepared and presented to the Mayor of the said City by the Board of Freeholders of the said City and will be submitted to the Voters of said City for ratification at the Annual Election of said City to be held on Tuesday, the 5th day of April, A. D. 1910. Hans Sunderson, City Clerk. First Proposed Amendment. We propose that section seventy-seven of the said Charter of said City be amended to read as follows: "INTOXICATING LIQUORS. "Sec. 77. All of the general laws of the State of Minnesota pertaining in any manner to the sale of intoxicating liquors, shall, as far as applicable, be in force in, and apply to the City of Willmar. Provided, however, that the legal voters of the City of Willmar shall have the power and authority to vote upon and determine for themselves, the question whether license for the sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage shall be granted by the council of said City or not; and it shall be the duty of the clerk of the City of Willmar, upon receiving a petition for that purpose, signed by legal voters of said City to at least fifteen (15) per centum of the entire vote cast at the last preceding annual Charter election, to call a special election to be held on said day, at any time not less than twenty days before any annual election of said City, to give at least ten days notice that the question of granting licenses for the sale of intoxicating liquors as a beverage in said City, will be submitted to the legal voters thereof at the next ensuing annual election, which question shall be determined by ballot, and the words "In Favor of License" or "Against License," as the case may be. Provided further, however, that the neglect of the clerk to give the required notice shall not invalidate the vote and determination made under the provisions of this section, if the petition named shall have been duly filed. The votes upon said question shall be taken, canvassed, returned and announced in the same manner as is prescribed by this charter for the taking, canvassing, returning and announcing the votes for the election of the City Clerk. If the question so made shall continue until the same annual election in the same manner as is prescribed by this charter, a majority of the votes cast at such election on said question shall be taken, canvassed, returned and announced in the same manner as is prescribed by law."

Second Proposed Amendment. We propose that section ninety-five of the said Charter of said City be amended to read as follows: "POWER TO BORROW MONEY OR INCUR DEBT. "Sec. 95. The City of Willmar may issue Bonds by or for the following purposes: 1. For the purpose of constructing, regulating, maintaining, extending, enlarging or improving suitable water or light plants, or either of them or for the purpose of providing for the main sewers, septic tanks, filtering plants, and other appurtenances pertaining to a sewer system. Such ordinance for the issuance of bonds may provide that the same shall be general obligations of the City or that they shall not be general obligations, but shall be payable out of any assessed taxes, assessments, funds or liens held by the City or may limit the City's liability thereon in any other manner or shall guarantee that the City shall pay for the same, provided that the bonds so issued under subdivision one of this section shall always be general obligations of the City. The City shall have authority to protect itself by acquiring title to any property subject to special assessment for local improvements, and shall have authority by ordinance to assign and convey any property so acquired, whether proceedings to acquire such title have been had prior to the time of the going into effect of this charter or thereafter, and shall have the power in like manner to assign any lien or right of action, held by the City on account of or arising out of any such assessment, as security for the payment of any bonds, certificates of indebtedness or other evidence of indebtedness mentioned in this section, or to provide that such bonds, certificates or other evidence of indebtedness mentioned herein, may be collected out of any such property, liens or rights of action. Whenever the Council shall pass any ordinance to issue bonds pursuant to the provision of subdivisions one, two and four of this section, such ordinance shall provide for the submission to the legal voters of the City, at some general or special election to be called by the Council for that purpose, the proposition for issuing said bonds, to an amount deemed by said Council to be necessary for the purpose, whether general or special, and with the same formalities as special and general elections are conducted under the general laws of this State. The ballot to be voted at such election shall read substantially as follows:— "Shall bonds be issued by the City of Willmar, under the provision of section 95, Chapter V., of the Charter of said City to the amount of \_\_\_\_\_ dollars, for the purpose of \_\_\_\_\_, and no such bonds shall be issued until such ordinance has been approved by a majority of the legal voters voting at such election. The debt of the City shall not be increased by bonds or otherwise beyond eight (8) per cent of the total value of the taxable property of the City according to the last preceding assessment for the purpose of taxation; provided, that bonds may be issued as above provided in subdivisions one, two and four, but the total amount of such bonds when added to the other indebtedness of the City shall not exceed nine (9) per cent of its taxable property as above defined; and provided, further, that bonds may be issued as above provided, for funding the City's bonded indebtedness whenever required; and provided further, that certificates of indebtedness against taxes levied and assessed may be issued as hereinafter provided. Bonds, certificates and other evidences of indebtedness and obligations of the City authorized by this section shall in no event bear a greater rate of interest than six per cent per annum, and if they run for more than five years shall not bear a greater rate of interest than five per cent per annum, and shall in no event bear a greater rate than the par value thereof, and shall be sold in accordance with the provisions of section 785 of the Revised Laws of the State of Minnesota. Except as provided in this section, no warrants, bonds or other evidence of indebtedness shall be issued by the City or any one in its behalf."

Third Proposed Amendment. We propose that section one hundred and eighty-four of the said Charter of said City be amended to read as follows: "ASSESSMENT TO BE CERTIFIED. "Sec. 184. When said assessment is so confirmed, it, together with all affidavits of publication and proofs of service of notices connected therewith, shall be duly certified by said commissioners, and filed with the City Clerk, and said Auditor shall divide each assessment into four equal parts as nearly as the same can be divided, and shall, in proper books to be provided by said City, and kept by said Auditor and said City Clerk, extend the same in proper columns in such manner that said assessment shall extend over four successive years succeeding to the year in which said assessment has been so ordered—that is to say: Said assessments are to be paid in four equal annual installments, with interest to be paid annually on each one of said installments from the date of the confirmation of said assessment at the rate of six (6) per centum per annum, and the owner or owners, or other person, whose duty or right it may be to pay such special assessments, shall have the right to pay the same with the deduction provided for in Section 190 of this Charter at any time before the lapse of time for the appeal provided for in this Charter, or they may pay the same in said four annual installments, with interest, as aforesaid, on each one of said deferred installments, to be paid annually at the time of paying the installment due each year. And the auditor of said Kandiyohi County shall, at the time of so extending said special assessment on the tax list in such parallel columns for each year's installment, add to the amount of each installment, interest on each installment remaining unpaid, at the said rate of six (6) per centum per annum on the whole of such unpaid installments; and said interest on the whole of said installments shall be paid each year at the same time and in the same manner that said installments are to be paid. Any such assessment or installment thereof, and the interest thereon, shall not have been paid on or before the first day of January following the return thereof, shall thereafter be payable to the County Treasurer as other taxes and assessments are payable, and shall become delinquent, and be subject to a like penalty as state and county taxes; and said County Treasurer shall make settlement with the City Treasurer for all collections made by him on account thereof in the same manner as for other taxes levied in the City. Said Clerk shall also make and certify a copy of said assessment to the treasurer of the City, whose duty it shall be to receive payment of all such assessments and installments, and interest, up to and including the thirty-first day of December following, and said assessment shall bear interest at the above mentioned rate from the date of the confirmation, payable annually. When any such assessment or installment thereof is paid to the Treasurer of the City he shall give duplicate receipts therefor one of which shall be delivered to the clerk, who shall thereupon mark upon his roll opposite the appropriate parcel of land the words "Paid on the \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 1910," and on the first day of January following, the clerk, after comparing his roll with the roll in the office of the Treasurer, shall certify to the County Auditor all payments made on account of such assessment, and said Auditor shall mark on his book, opposite the appropriate parcel of land, therein described, the word "Paid."

The purpose of the proposed amendment to the last above named section is to extend the time for the payment of any special assessments that the City may hereafter make for the building of sewers, laying of sidewalks and grading or paving of streets, from one year, as now provided by the charter, to cover a period of four (4) years, and to be payable in four equal yearly amounts, if any owner of property within the City shall desire to take advantage thereof.

ADVANCE FARM SCHEDULE Farmers to be Furnished Copies Before the Census Begins. Washington, D. C., March 14, 1910. A great increase in the accuracy of the census returns from the farmers, a considerable saving of the working time of the farm enumerators, and the removal of much of whatever misapprehensions and prejudices may exist among farmers with regard to the census, are the important results expected by the United States Census Bureau to follow the use of the Advance Farm Schedule, which has been adopted and will be circulated, through the rural postmasters, among the farmers a short time before the actual census taking. The employment of this advance schedule is a distinct innovation in census methods. It is the logical and practical outcome of the Census Bureau's persistent effort for some time past to give the farmers a clear and comprehensive preliminary knowledge of the Farm Census questions and to induce them to keep written records of their farm operations and equipment in readiness for the call of the enumerators, beginning April 15 next. Four million copies of the schedule will be printed, and the distribution of them among farm owners and tenants will be entrusted to the farm enumerators soon after they are commissioned, about April 1. Postmaster-General Hitchcock has promised the assistance of his department in the effective distribution of the schedules, and he will issue instructions relative thereto to the rural postmasters. They will be required to address and forward to the farmers receiving mail at their offices the advance farm schedules supplied them by the enumerators. In a note to farmers on the front page of the schedule, Census Director Durand states: "In accordance with the act of Congress, the census of the population and farms of the United States will begin on April 15, 1910. On or soon after that date an enumerator will call at your house for the purpose of obtaining the required information concerning your farm. Many of the questions which will be asked you concerning the equipment and operations of your farm cannot be accurately answered by you without considerable thought and the making of careful calculations or estimates. Therefore, this form has been sent to you in advance, so that you may study the questions at your convenience and have the answers written before the enumerator comes. You are earnestly requested to read this form and instructions carefully, to write down the answers to all questions that apply to your farm, and to keep it until the enumerator comes. By doing this you can save yourself much time and contribute greatly to the success of the agricultural census. Besides the information concerning your farm, the enumerator will also ask you the names, ages, and other facts concerning the members of your household. When in need of glasses call on C. H.
