

consciousness, and finally passed away Saturday morning.

Mrs. Erickson was born near Kjöpinge, Kristianstad's Län, Sweden, February 28, 1821, and she was thus 89 years and 26 days of age at the time of death. She and her husband, Andrew Erickson, came to this country in 1868, and in the same year settled on a homestead in Whitefield. When the family came to this county there was not even a shanty where the city of Willmar now is, and the railroad did not come before a year and a half later. Andrew Erickson died about 14 years ago, and his widow made her home with her son ever since. Besides this son, the deceased is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Hannah Peterson of St. Paul.

The funeral was held Monday afternoon, services being conducted at the residence and at the Swedish Baptist church by Rev. C. E. Oberg. Interment was made at the Fairview cemetery.
