## MEETS DEATH IN RUNAWAY

### Mrs. Emma Swenson Instantly Killed While Trying to Escape from Runaway.

Mrs. Emma Swenson jumped from a platform buggy last Friday, in a runaway on the road near I. I. Berg's place northwest of the city, and was instantly killed. Such was the shocking news in brief that spread thru the city last Friday afternoon. The victim of the sad accident was a widow living in Sec. 19, Dove, on the Mamre line, who was riding to town with a neighbor and wife to do a little trading.  
It was Andrew Olson who owned the rig and with whom the unfortunate woman was riding. Mrs. Swenson and Mrs. Olson sat in the back seat of the vehicle, Mr. Olson sitting in the front seat and driving. Among other things with which the buggy was loaded were two cases of eggs, one of which belonged to Mrs. Swenson. All was well the first six miles travelled, but as the party neared Willmar on what is known as Helmer's Hill, one of the bolts which held the tongue frame to the buggy axle, loosened and fell out. The team became unmanageable as soon as the wagon ran sideways against them. Mrs. Swenson became desperately frightened and first pitching out her case of eggs onto the road jumped out of the rig with the result that her neck was broken in the fall. Mrs. Olson says that she tried to hold the terrified woman in the seat without success. Had she remained in the rig she might possibly have escaped with only slight injury. As the horses continued their wild chase, the buggy was upset and the second bolt holding the tongue was broken. This freed the horses from the wreck and they ran as far as the backyard without doing much more damage. Mr. and Mrs. Olson escaped with a few minor bruises.  
The remains of Mrs. Swenson were taken to Peterson's undertaking rooms. The funeral took place Sunday afternoon. The deceased was a member of the Swedish Baptist church, and Rev. Carl Oberg officiated at the obsequies. A large number of Willmar people joined the funeral cortege, which proceeded to the Lundby church, where services were held. The interment took place in the adjoining churchyard at the side of the grave of Swen Swenson, the husband, who died in 1901. A large number of mourning neighbors and friends attended the sad gathering. The pallbearers were the following: Peter Johnson, E. N. Nelson, A. John Anderson, O. H. Ekdahl, P. E. Parson and Renius Swenson.  
The deceased was born in Kil parish, Varmland, Sweden, 54 years, lacking one day, before her death. She was considerably younger than her husband, who was 73 years old at the time of his death. A son, sixteen years old, Swen Swenson, Jr., is the only immediate relative known to survive the deceased. The boy, left alone in the world by this terrible accident, has the heartfelt sympathy of all in his loneliness and sorrow.

## COL. T. ROOSEVELT AT WILLMAR

Col. Theodore Roosevelt will be at Willmar next Sunday between 12:00 and 12:30 o'clock. His special train consisting of engine, baggage car, and two Pullmans, Forest and Republic, will leave Sioux Falls at 8:30 a. m. and it is expected that the run of 138 miles to Willmar will take about four hours. The train will change crews here, and the running gear will be inspected, after which the train will continue on its way to Fargo, where the Colonel will speak on Monday. In anticipation that America's best known man will show himself and perhaps address the people it is a safe prediction that an enormous crowd of citizens will be on hand at the Willmar passenger station when Col. Roosevelt's special pulls in. The train is scheduled to arrive at Fargo at six o'clock p. m.

## Three Good Farms Sold.

The A. H. Brown Agency reports three important deals in lands. The Nels Norman farm adjoining Kandiyohi Station on the south and consisting of 120 acres of land, was sold to G. Pearson of Red Wing, Minn., at the price of \$9,700. Mr. Pearson will take possession March 1 next.
