ENGINE WORKS RE-OPENED

J. Emil Nelson Makes Good His Promise to Re-Open Engine Factory.

Arrangements have been completed for the reopening of the Gasoline Engine factory in this city. The factory is the property of The J. Emil Nelson Corporation, and it will be run by the Corporation, with H. T. Borsheim, of Charles City, Iowa, as superintendent. Mr. Borsheim has for six years been head draughtsman in one of the departments of the well known Hart-Parr Company in Charles City, and he comes here with a well founded reputation as a draughtsman and practical machinist. He was here some time ago to look over the factory and its equipment as well as to ascertain what chances for success the new corporation would have, and after a thorough examination and investigation he decided to leave his lucrative position with the Hart-Parr people and come to Willmar. Mr. Borsheim has purchased a considerable amount of stock in The J. Emil Nelson Corporation, of which he will be one of the directors. He will arrive in a few days to put everything in running order at the factory. It will be operated as a machine repair shop but the main effort will be expended in the manufacture of the Willmar engine. This engine stands in the front rank among stationary engines, and The J. Emil Nelson Corporation will push its manufacture and sale to their utmost ability, and with a man of Mr. Borsheim's experience and skill at the head of the plant the No. 10 engine will become one of the important manufacturing establishments of this part of the state.

THORPE WITHDRAWS; ODELL IS DRAFTED

In a letter addressed to Thomas H. Olson, chairman of the Republican County Committee, Senator L. O. Thorpe Tuesday last week resigned from the candidacy for reelection to the senatorship. The county committee was called together Friday and named Chas. W. Odell, of the First National Bank of Willmar, as the substitute to take up the campaign, he having been found willing to accept.

SCHOOLS RECEIVE AID FROM STATE

Annual Apportionment Gives Kandiyohi \$13,119 with \$5100 Special State Aid.

C. G. Schulz, state superintendent of schools, yesterday announced the apportionment of the state school fund for the current year. Each pupil will receive \$3, and as Kandiyohi county had 4373 pupils entitled to state aid, it will receive \$13,119. The apportionment is based on the school enrollment for the year ending July 31, 1909. In addition 49 of the 98 rural schools in the county will receive a special state aid, varying in amount in accordance with how they are graded. 30 will receive \$150 each, 12 \$100 each, and the remaining 7 \$300 each. Last year one of the semi-graded schools entitled to \$300 did not receive this amount because it voted to have only five months school instead of eight as required by law but this year that district was re-instated as it measured up to the requirements.

TRIBUTE AUTO TOUR THROUGH WILLMAR.

The Tribune Reliability Tour passed thru here Friday afternoon between 1:30 and 3:30 o'clock. The members of the party made no attempt to keep together, each driver determining his own speed. The object of the tour is to prove mechanical reliability and fuel and lubrication economy, and for that reason those who take part avoid sensational runs for the most part. Barring a strong gale blowing directly from the west the weather was favorable. A good deal of interest was taken in the tour by citizens in every town on the route, and everywhere the tourists were greeted by large turnouts. But one unfortunate incident occurred to mar the sport. Several miles on the other side of Litchfield boards with nails had been laid across the path and as a result several tires were punctured.
