MAMRE MELODIES

Mamre, Nov. 14—Mrs. Sylene Erlandson died at the home of her sister, Mrs. J. Stonghelle last Saturday afternoon at half past three o'clock, after an illness of some weeks, death being due mostly to old age. Mrs. Erlandson was born in Brudivig, Sogn, Norway, and was at the time of her death nearly 80 years old. In 1868 she came from Norway to Wisconsin at which place she stayed about four years, coming from there to Mamre where she some time later was united in marriage to Hakan Erlandson, who owned a farm about five miles northeast from Penock on the shore of Solomon Lake. Mr. Erlandson died about eleven years ago. The farm was then taken in charge by Carl Stonghelle, a nephew of the deceased, who has since that time supported her until her death. She leaves to mourn her one son, Johannes, a resident of Danvers; two sisters, Mrs. Stonghelle of Mamre and Mrs. Anna Nelson of Willmar, and 11 grand children. She will be laid to rest beside her husband in the cemetery at the Mamrelund church. The date of funeral was not known at this writing.
