KANDIYOHI COUNTY SHOWS A SMALL GAIN IN POPULATION.

The population of Kandiyohi county according to the 1910 census is 18,969, which is a gain of only 553 over ten years ago and a gain of 5,972 over the census of 1890. The complete figures for the subdivisions have not been given out as yet, only the totals for each county of the state. The population of Minnesota is now 2,075,708, an increase of 324,314 since 1900. While the increase in Kandiyohi county is not very great during the last decade, it is a good showing compared with other counties in the neighborhood. Most of our neighbors show a loss. Swift loses 554; Renville loses 570; McLeod loses 904; Meeker loses 731; Wright

1,075; Pope gains 159; Chippewa gains 959; Stearns gains 3,269. When the details become public it will no doubt be shown that the gains have as a rule been made in the cities and villages and that the country population has diminished slightly. The showing should spur on all legitimate efforts to encourage the immigration of farmers from the older states to come in and buy and improve the vacant farms or such as are being indifferently farmed by tenants. If the methods of farming in this county were intensified to the degree which its soil is capable of, it would support treble the population it now has, or more. Here is a worthy object of public enterprise and boosting.

Jensen's Funeral at Atwater.

The funeral of the late Carl Johan Jensen was held at Atwater and the body was placed in Thronhjelm church cemetery. A cousin of the deceased, C. B. Jensen, arrived from Jasper, the morning of following the funeral and stated that four months ago he last saw his cousin as he was leaving for St. Cloud. From there he went to Pipestone and was evidently returning to Jasper when the fatal accident happened. He leaves a father, three sisters and three brothers in Norway. The news of his death will be sad indeed for his dear ones in the Fatherland at this happy holiday time.
