Sealed bids will be received by the city council of the city of Willmar, Minnesota, at the Council Chambers in said city, up to eight (8) o'clock in the afternoon of May 20th, 1911, for the purchase of the sewer bonds of said city of Willmar to the amount of thirty-thousand (\$30,000.00) dollars, or as much more as said city may require, but in no event to exceed the amount of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000.00); any excess above thirty-thousand dollars (\$30,000.00) to be furnished to such amount and at such times as said city may direct.

day of June, 1911, will be in denominations of one thousand dollars each, or multiple thereof, will be payable twenty years from the date of issue at the office of the treasurer of the city of Willmar, and will bear interest at not exceeding five per cent per annum, payable semi-annually.

No bid will be considered at less than their par value and accrued interest.

A certified check to the amount of ten per cent of the bid, payable to the city treasurer of the city of Willmar, shall accompany each proposal.

Reasonable time will be granted

after the acceptance of any bid to pass upon the validity of said bonds, but any successful bidder failing or neglecting to accept or reject the same within fifteen (15) days after notice of his bid being accepted by the city council, shall forfeit the certified check accompanying said bid.

Harrison, May 15—John Skoglund of Spicer was out to B. M. Johnson's the first part of the week and put in the foundation for the machine shed which was built some time ago.


Thomas McCrimmon was in Atwater on business on Tuesday.
