**THE FUNERAL OF THE LATE REV. LUNDBERG**

The funeral of the late Rev. J. O. Lundberg at Svea last Thursday was largely attended, not only by members of the Swedish Lutheran congregations in this county and from the deceased pastor's last charge, Beckville, Rosendale and Cosmos in Meeker County, but by numbers of others who came to pay their respects to the memory of the departed. Not half of those present were able to get inside of the church.

Seven pastors, colleagues of the departed, took part in the services. Revs. Hanson, Walters, Norsen, Alex Peterson, Gustaf Peterson, Linner and Ryden. The services in the church opened with Bible reading and prayer by Rev. Walters. Short addresses were made by all the pastors. The Svea choir sang selections and three solos were interspersed. A profusion of floral offerings filled the chancel of the church. The pall-bearers were the members of the Svea church council—Messrs. Bengt Carlson, Isaac Johnson, J. A. Engvall, August Lindblad, J. A. Lindblad and Louis Strandberg.

Rev. Norsen spoke of his 29 years of comradeship with the deceased and applied 2 Tim. 4: 6-8. Rev. Ryden spoke of the work done by his predecessor in the local field. Rev. Alex Peterson made a brief discourse using Rev. 6:8 as his subject. Rev. Gustaf Peterson made the personal and biographical references. Arriving in this country in 1886, the deceased applied himself to studies and was ordained in Redwing in 1888. He served five years in the Big Stone district as missionary on the frontier settlements, was pastor at Svea 22 years, giving this community the best years of his life, and a little more

than a year ago he moved to Meeker county. Rev. Linner of Litchfield spoke briefly of the circumstances of the death of the departed. He also spoke on behalf of the bereaved family, expressing their thanks for the assistance and sympathy shown. He read a poem written by Rev. Ryden as expressing the feelings of the Svea congregation. He also read a number of messages and resolutions of condolence from the different church councils and from the pastors of the Big Stone district in session at Ortonville. Rev. Hanson offered the final prayer.

The opportunity to cast a farewell look at the wellknown features of the deceased was given and for nearly an hour a constant succession of old friends and neighbors passed the casket. Finally the solemn procession moved out of the church to the church yard where the casket was lowered to its last resting place. Passages of scripture were read by the clergymen at the grave and the Beckville choir sang "Nearer, My God to Thee."

Among the many floral offerings were a large "gates ajar" from the Svea church, an "open Bible" by the Cosmos church, a standing wreath from Rosendale, "gates ajar" from Beckville congregation, standing crosses from Christine and Bethel congregations, broken wheel by the Laides Aid and Young People's societies of Cosmos, a harp from the young people of Beckville, standing anchor by the confirmation class at Beckville and a standing star from the class at Cosmos. Besides these there were family and personal tributes.

The occasion was an impressive one that will never be forgotten by those who attended.
