## CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Council Chambers, Library Building, Willmar, Minnesota, May 29th, 1911.

Adjourned meeting of the City Council. Mayor Wellin called the meeting to order. On roll call the following members of the Council were present: Mayor Wellin, Aldermen Frederickson, Johnson, Anderson, Hedin, Erickson, Sperry, Dahlheim and Norman, 9; absent none. City Attorney Stanford was also present.

Moved and seconded that the Council proceed to consider bids for the purchase of the sewer bonds as advertised. Carried.

Sealed bids of Thomas J. Bolger Co., S. A. Kean and Co., Well, Roth & Co., all of Chicago; Minneapolis Trust Co., Minneapolis; Harris Trust & Savings Bank; E. H. Rollins & Sons; C. H. Coffin; C. F. Childs & Co., all of Chicago; Minnesota Loan & Trust Co., Union Investment Co., Wells & Dickey Co., U. M. Stoddard & Co., all of Minneapolis; H. C. Spears & Sons Co., Chicago; and The Tallman Investment Co. of Willmar, were opened and read.

The bid of Wells & Dickey Co., Minneapolis, offering to take the entire issue at straight 4 1/2 per cent interest, being the best bid, was accepted.

Alderman Anderson offered the following resolution which was adopted by the following vote: "Ayes", Aldermen Frederickson, Johnson, Anderson, Hedin, Erickson, Sperry, Dahlheim and Norman, 8; noes none.

### RESOLUTION.

Resolved that the bid of Wells & Dickey Co., for the bonds of the City of Willmar in the amount of \$30,000 par value thereof, or as much more as the city may require but not to exceed the amount of \$40,000 par value thereof, said bonds being authorized under and by the provisions of Ordinance No. 115, at the following price, to wit: the par value of said bonds and accrued interest, the said bonds to bear interest at 4 1/2 per cent per annum, be and the same is hereby accepted.

Knute Berg appeared and asked to have Park avenue, First Ward, graded. The matter was on motion referred to the Street Committee.

Samuel Porter appeared and presented a petition by Anton Knoblauch, Philip J. Halev and others asking for the vacation of a street on the East side of Paulson & Sunde's sub-division of Lot "D" of the Eastern Addition to the City of Willmar. Alderman Johnson presented the following resolution which was unanimously adopted, all members voting "Aye".

### RESOLUTION.

Whereas, Anton Knoblauch, Philip J. Halev and others have presented to the City Council of the City of Willmar a duly verified petition asking that the part of that street lying east of Lots 1, 2, 3 and 22 of Block 4 of Paulson & Sunde's Sub-division of Lot "D" of the Eastern Addition to the City of Willmar between Benson and Litchfield Avenues be vacated, and the City Council of the said City deeming it expedient that the said matter should be proceeded with,

Therefore resolved that the said petition be filed and that the Clerk of the said City give the notice required by the Charter of the said City and that said matter be heard on Monday, the 26th day of June, A. D. 1911, at the hour of eight o'clock, in the afternoon of that day, at the Council Chambers in the Library Building in the said City.

O. A. Ferring appeared and reported that through some error his lot in block 5, Ferrings addition was assessed for street grading.

The matter was referred to the City Attorney.

The Mayor announced the appointment of Rev. G. Peterson, Elias Raehie and J. O. Estrem as members of the Library Board to serve for a term of three years. The appointments were confirmed by the Council.

Official bond of Lewis Fridlund as Secretary of the Water and Light Commission, contract bonds of D. B. Daugherty and the Minn. and Western Grain Co. were presented and were on motion referred to the City Attorney. The City Attorney reported the said bonds back as correct in form and execution and on motion the bonds were approved by the Council.

Requisitions for supplies from the Water and Light Commission were presented and read and the Clerk was on motion instructed to order the supplies.

J. A. Rowat was appointed Engineer to have charge of the sewer construction, when commenced; the said engineer to devote all his time to said work and such other city engineering work as may be ordered. His compensation was

Stripped Cucumber Beetle and the True Squash Bug.

The first of these, a biting insect, and the second, a sucking insect, attack watermelons, cucumbers and squashes, and they are often confounded, both being called "squash bugs". This is unfortunate, because they call for radically different treatment. We would suggest planting an excess of seed for the first named insect, dusting plants with one pound of Paris green fixed with fifty pounds lie or cheap flour. The beetles can to a certain extent be driven away by air-slacked lime alone, dusting it liberally on and about the plants in each hill.

In the true squash bugs we would recommend hand-picking of bugs in the early morning, also hand-picking of the large yellow eggs. Destroy all vines after harvesting crop. Plants can be kept covered with light frames of cheese-cloth while small.—F. L. Washburn, University Farm.

Because the fly is small and does not roar like a lion or devour its prey at a mouthful, mankind has paid little attention to it. But the fly is as deadly a foe to civilization as any of the pests of more fearful aspect which man has made it his business to exterminate. The fly's attack is insidious and therefore the more to be guarded against. He buzzes into the house, drops his deadly disease germs where they will fertilize, and buzzes out again to pick up a fresh cargo. Swat him. He is your enemy.—Ex.


