
LAKE ELIZABETH LEAKINGS

SWEDISH MISSION SALEM CHURCH PASSES 40 YEARS



THE SALEM CHURCH.

The fortieth anniversary of the Salem Mission church was fittingly celebrated last Sunday. There was an immense throng of people present, many of them from Willmar. The ministers present who participated in the exercises were Revs. J. G. Sjöquist, of Dassel; Isaac Nelson from Kewanee, Ill.; Emil Larson of Maple Plain, Minn.; Theo Paulson of Willmar and A. W. Franklin, the local pastor. There were songs rendered by the Salem and Lundby choirs. The historical sketch was given by Rev. J. G. Sjöquist, who himself was instrumental in the organization of the church in 1871, and became the first pastor. He was succeeded in 1876 by Rev. C. M. Youngquist. In 1886 Rev. A. Sundberg became the pastor. In October, 1889, Rev. Nels Frykman was called to become the pastor, and he remained in charge for twenty years. The present pastor Rev. A. W. Franklin, took charge three years ago.
The first church was built in 1872, and the old parsonage in 1875. Both these old buildings were added to and rebuilt at subsequent times. The new church was erected in 1897, but has been improved several times since then. Last year the Salem congregation together with those of Lundby and Lake Florida, joined in erecting a fine modern parsonage for the use of their beloved pastor, who has labored with marked success among his people. The fortieth anniversary jubilee meeting will long be remembered by those present as an inspiring occasion.
