### FORSBERG IS COMMISSIONER

#### The Office Seeks the Man in This Case and a Splendid Choice is Made.

August O. Forsberg of Willmar was elected County Commissioner from the First District to succeed the late Thos. H. Olson, last Friday afternoon. The ten electors, as named in our last issue, convened at 2 o'clock and began balloting. Among those receiving votes on the first ballot were O. O. Bergstrom, P. J. Haley, August Falk and T. Stob. After a number of ballots it was found that no choice could be made as the supporters of each candidate were loath to give up their man. After a recess H. P. Eddy of Whitefield was proposed as a compromise candidate and he received 4 votes, Stob 3 and Bergstrom 3. A number of ballots were taken, all with the same result. After another recess Mr. Forsberg's

name was brought out by the chairman of the Mamre and Whitefield townships as a second compromise candidate and he won out, receiving 6 votes. It is understood that the last ballot stood 6 for Forsberg, 3 for Stob and 1 for Haley. The result was a great surprise to Mr. Forsberg as he had not been a candidate and did not dream of being chosen for the place. On being notified, however, he promptly qualified and filed his oath of office. The selection meets with general approval throughout the district and the Tribune feels certain that Mr. Forsberg will give the county faithful and efficient service and be a credit to the place.

#### Crow River Synod Church Celebrates Its 50th Anniversary Next Sunday.

The fiftieth anniversary of the organization of the first distinctively Norwegian church in Kandiyohi county, then Monongalia county, will be fittingly observed on the Crow River church, Town of Barbank, next Sunday, September 3rd. Services will begin at 11 o'clock a. m., when D. C. Jordahl will speak, and an offering will be taken for the missions. Dinner will be served free to everybody in the grove at the parsonage. After dinner Rev. N. Giere of Sacred Heart, Minn., a former pastor of the church, will make an address. An English address will be made by Dr. E. O. Giere of Madison, Minn. Two bands and two choirs will furnish music. An offering will be taken up for church extensions. This promises to be a jubilee of a great deal of interest, and Rev. T. O. Tolo asks the Tribune to extend his cordial invitation to everybody to attend. Rev. Tolo has edited a fine historical album containing reproductions of hundreds of pictures of the early members. This publication will be one of the most interesting and complete of its kind yet published in the county and a valuable addition to the printed historical records of the county.

### BURNING IN DAKOTA Andrew Hanson Goes West to Visit His Brother Hans, Who Lost Wife in Fire.

Last Saturday Mrs. Jens Peterson of this city read an account of a fatal burning at Berlin, N. D., in a Norwegian paper, in which the names seemed familiar to her. The man's name was Hans P. Hanson, and she showed the letter to Andrew Hanson, their neighbor, who has a brother living in that neighborhood. Mr. Hanson at once made inquiries over the 'phone, and found that it was his brother who was the victim of the misfortune. He left Sunday night to go and see him. He found him in a sad plight. Two weeks ago last Friday the explosion of gasoline in a small gasoline stove set fire to the clothes of the wife, and the pressure of the gas was so great that they could not open the doors of the small house. The husband broke out a window and pushed out his wife, but before he could render her assistance every vestige of clothes was burned from her. She lived for three hours, before death relieved her from her suffering. She was about twenty-eight years old. Her maiden name was Miss Daisy Campbell, having moved out to Dakota with her parents from Ohio six years ago. The bereaved husband is well known in Willmar, having stayed here a year after arriving from the old country, nine years ago. He owns 160 acres of land, but all his personal effects were destroyed with the house at the time his wife was burned. He escaped with some light burns. The farm is seven miles out from Berlin.
