TWO AUTO PARADES

Willmar Motor Club Planning For Two Parades During Fair.

A special feature Thursday evening at the Willmar Street Fair will be an after-dark parade. Cars are to form on Fifth Street, between Becker and Litchfield avenues. The route will then extend west to Tenth, north to Pacific avenue, east to Third street, south to Litchfield avenue, west to 9th, south to Becker, east to Second, north to Pacific avenue, west thru Fair street and disband. John B. Boyd, general marshal, and Lee Somerville, official starter. All autos are requested to join in this parade and decorate their autos with the Street Fair colors. The start will be made at 7:30 p. m.

The regular parade will take place Saturday afternoon, at three o'clock and will run from the same place of beginning, at the Library, then west to Tenth, north to Ella, Ella to Seventh, south to Pacific, east to Second, south to Litchfield, east to Bertha, south to Becker, west on Becker to Third, north to Pacific, thru Fair street and disband.

A prize of \$5.00 is offered by the Willmar Motor Club for the best decorated auto in the latter parade, and one of \$3.00 to the second best. John B. Boyd will be marshal and Lee Somerville official starter.

St. Cloud Saloonkeeper Shot.

St. Cloud, Minn., Sept. 9.—A Lindenberg, a saloonkeeper, was waylaid here at midnight last night, and may die of a gunshot wound just below the heart.

Lindenberg has been in the habit of carrying home from his saloon the receipts of his evening's business. Late last night, when he was about to open the screen door on the porch of his house, he was seized by two men and robbed of \$8 in cash. He yelled for the police, whereupon one of the men drew a revolver and shot him at close range just below the heart. The gun man then threw his weapon away and, with his companion, took to flight.

Lindenberg managed to crawl to the next door, the home of his son-in-law, and give the alarm. The police was summoned and the search for the holdups began. Two men, who were found sleeping in a barn, were arrested, but so far nothing has developed to connect them with the robbery and shooting. All the trains were watched and word was sent to all adjoining towns, but no clues were found.

Motor Club Re-organized.

The Willmar Motor Club was re-organized last week, at an enthusiastic meeting of a number of local auto owners. F. G. Handy was elected president, G. H. Otterness, vice president, and Fred Larson, secretary and treasurer. About fifty members have joined and paid their first year's dues so far, and it is expected that nearly that many more can be induced to join.

The objects of the Club is to work for better roads and promote the interests of motor owners generally. One of the things already provided for by the Club are signs giving the speed permitted within the city to be placed on the roads at the city limits, also signs to be placed near curves, and other dangerous places. The two auto parades to be given during the Street Fair are under the auspices of the Willmar Motor Club, and the prizes offered are furnished by the Club.

Boy Hero at Mendota.

The storm of Monday morning washed out a large portion of the tracks on the Omaha near Mendota. The Omaha train was coming at the rate of 60 miles an hour, trying to make up time. A 17-year-old boy, Eugene Labbey, noticed the break in the track, and realizing the danger of a train coming around the curve, stationed himself near the track and flagged the train with his red bandanna handkerchief, and saved the 100 or more passengers from a horrible danger. The boy hastened away to get his cows which he had left in order to watch for the train. He did not think his act was "anything" but some of the passengers pressed a purse of \$10.70 upon him before he made his get-away.

Pioneer Minnesota Co-operator.

Hutchinson, Minn., Sept. 11.—Carl Hagen, a pioneer of this county, veteran of the Civil war and a man widely known and universally esteemed, is dead at the age of 77 years. He organized at Biscay, the first farmers' co-operative creamery in Minnesota. He also founded the Sumter Fire Insurance association, another farmers' organization. He belonged to the Thirty-second Indiana infantry and was wounded in an engagement at Green River, Ky., in 1861.
