KANDIYOHI COUNTY EXHIBIT AT MINNESOTA STATE FAIR

The Kandiyohi County exhibit at the Minnesota State Fair made good. In variety of exhibits it scored sufficiently high to participate in the distribution of prize money, the minimum score being 800. It also drew sixth prize for beauty of arrangement among the 32 county exhibits. The total prize money drawn will amount to \$222.

The unique front and signs of the Kandiyohi county booth seldom failed to halt the passer-by, and the spoken compliments of visitors were continuous. Had the ladies had the judging to do, it is a safe prediction that we would have stood still higher on the beauty list.

A large sign overhead was made by Mrs. Ahlstrom by gluing corn on a board. The rustic sign hanging over the door was made by the designers of the front.

All the Kandiyohi booklets provided thru the Willmar Commercial Club were exhausted before the fair was half over. One St. Paul real estate firm wired an order for 1,000 of the Kandiyohi booklets to be sent by express, which order unfortunately could not be filled. Mr. S. E. Peterson of Atwater spent much time at the booth during the week, relieving Supt. John Ahlstrom when obliged to leave for his meals or for other reasons.

The exhibit included 50 varieties of apples, 10 of plums, 62 varieties of native grasses, 6 tame grasses, 9 forage plants, 15 varieties of potatoes, 14 varieties of grains, 12 varieties of grains in sheaf, 40 varieties of culinary vegetables, 5 varieties of stock vegetables, 6 varieties of grapes, 4 of nuts, and 16 miscellaneous products of the soil.

Supt. Ahlstrom had an everbearing strawberry plant there, loaded with ripe luscious berries, that attracted much attention and was spoken of in the Twin city dailies. These strawberry plants begin to bear at the same time as ordinary plants and continue bearing until frost comes. The following is the score of the Kandiyohi exhibit as found by the judges:


Judge Burbank—

Mabelle Johnson visited with Arthur Erickson's over Sunday.



















