OBITUARY

MARI HARAMOEN.

The oldest person residing in New London or vicinity passed away March 1 at the age of ninety-three years, three months and twenty days. Mari Helgesdatter Haramoen was born in Flaas, Hallingdal, Norway, on November 9th, 1818. Her parents were Helge Stengrensen and Kari Knutsdatter. She married Nels Nelson Haramoen in 1842. Her husband died in 1877, leaving her a widow with eight children, Mrs. Karl Ronning of Bertram, Minn.; Nels Haramoen of New London; Mrs. Erickson, deceased; Helge Haramoen of St. Paul; Mrs. Anna Rauten of North Fork, Stearns County; John Haramoen of Ledgewood, N. D.; Mrs. Ragnhild Jorgensen of Norway Lake; and Mrs. Mary Helen Haramoen of St. Paul. She leaves thirty-two grand children and twelve great grand children. She emigrated to America in 1881 and settled in the township of North Fork, Stearns County. After the home of her husband and she has since lived with her children. About twelve years ago she came to New London and has lived with her son Nels since that time. She has not been in the best of health of late years and the last two years she has also been afflicted with blindness.

The funeral occurs today, Wednesday, from the residence of Nels Haramoen at 1:30 o'clock. Services will be held at the Free Lutheran church at 2 o'clock. Rev. Hanson officiating. The interment takes place in the Oak Hill cemetery. The pall bearers are Leonard Larson, Andrew Espen, Henry Sagadal, Gunder Ringen, Peder Eine and Hans Larson.

OLE GRENAGER.

Ole Grenager, an aged inmate of the Bethesda Old Folks Home, died this morning. The old gentleman with his aged wife here from St. Paul, Minn., about two weeks ago to spend his declining days at the Old Folks Home at Eagle Lake.
