OBITUARY

NELS TRULSON.

Nels Trulson, one of the early settlers of the township of Fahlun, passed away at his home at 418 Eighth Street last Thursday morning at nine a. m., from heart failure, after an illness of only one day, at an age of some over seventy-five years.

Nels Trulson was born at Melby, Scania, Sweden, May 18, 1837. Soon after his birth his parents moved to Brunnestad, where he grew to manhood. At the age of twenty-two he left home and was employed at farm work for some time. In 1869 Mr. Trulson and family came to this country, arriving at St. Paul May 10. They remained at Newport, near St. Paul, about one year. In the spring of 1869 Mr. Trulson took a homestead claim in section 18, town of Fahlun, and the family located there in the following fall. Mr. Trulson took a leading part in the development of the community. His was a quiet disposition, but his intelligence and good judgment made him a man of influence in his circle of acquaintances. Eight years ago Mr. Trulson retired from the farm and has been living in Willmar since that time. In 1865 he was united in marriage to Hannah Svendsdotter, who, together with seven children, survives him. The children are Mrs. Oscar Olson of Roseland, Mrs. J. Mortenson of Chicago, Mrs. Ed. Erickson of Whitefield, Edward Trulson of Minneapolis, Mrs. August Newberg of Whitefield, Mrs. F. W. Lindblad of Bowbells, N. D., and Otto Trulson of Coteau, N. D. The stricken family have the sympathy of many friends in their bereavement.

The funeral occurred yesterday (Tuesday) at 1:30 at the house and at two o'clock p. m., from the Swedish Mission church. Rev. A. W. Franklin of Pennock officiated. All the children were present except Mrs. Mortenson and Edward Trulson of Minneapolis. The son, Otto, arrived just in time to take a last look at his father, owing to a delay of the message. Other relatives present at the funeral were Thomas, Frank and Oscar Lindahl of Strandburg, S. D. There were many beautiful floral offerings. The Misses Hulda Hoglund and Anna Nickelson sang two duets. The pall bearers were Axel Hedin, Swan Melin, Peter Hoglund, A. J. Appelgren, J. W. Johnson and August Hoglund. The deceased was a man of sterling Christian character, who was highly respected by all who knew him.

about one o'clock the party landed on the east shore of the lake at the Indian Mounds, where a picnic was enjoyed. A walk was taken thru the mounds, over the historical ground of Irving townsite and back along the beautiful beach. A lunch was served and the editorial party is under obligation to Mrs. Frank Harris for furnishing utensils for the picnic lunch. Later in the afternoon the party again embarked on the launch and continued around the south side of the lake to Spicer. After a brief stop at Spicer the trip was continued to the Interlachen Hotel. Here a delicious banquet was served at seven o'clock. The tables were nicely decorated with ferns and the favors were sweet peas. Covers were laid for fifty-two. CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Dated July 8th, 1912. Wm. O. Johnson, A. H. Sperry, O. A. Norman, Street Committee.

The above report was accepted by the Council. Contract bond of J. H. Olson, signed by the Title Guaranty & Surety Co., Scranton, Pa., for the building of the new Fire Station and City Hall was presented and the same was referred to the City Attorney. The City Attorney reported the said bond back as correct in form and execution and on motion the bond was approved by the Council.

Mr. C. A. Dahlheim addressed the Council about his observation of material used on the new Sewer System that is now under construction, which remarks were duly considered by the Council, and attention was also called to material used which is not in accordance with specifications. The matter was carried over owing to the Engineer not being present.

A deed from Mrs. Cecelia Carlson for ground for the extension of Minnesota avenue between First and Jessie streets, as contracted for, was presented and the same was referred to the City Attorney. The City Attorney reported the said deed back as correct and it was accepted by the Council, and the Clerk was instructed to have said deed recorded.

The Clerk reported that \$101.30 had been collected by subscriptions and turned over to the City for the purchase of ground from Mrs. Carlson for the opening of Minnesota avenue. On motion Mrs. Carlson was ordered to remove buildings from the ground purchased from her by the City within ten (10) days.

A deed from A. E. Rice and N. O. Nelson, conveying seven lots in Block 11, Hanson's Addition in the Fourth Ward, for park purposes was presented. The said deed was referred to the City Attorney. The City Attorney reported the deed back as correct and the report was accepted.

Alderman Freeberg offered the following resolution which was unanimously adopted. RESOLUTION. Whereas, A. E. Rice and N. O. Nelson have heretofore offered to make a gift to the City of Willmar of lots 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13 and 14 of Block 11 in Hanson's Addition to the City of Willmar, Minnesota, to be used for Park purposes, and,

Whereas, It is the opinion of the City Council that said tract may be needed by the City for said Park Purposes, and,

Whereas, said A. E. Rice and N. O. Nelson have tendered to the said City of Willmar a good and sufficient Warranty Deed covering said premises, containing the following condition, to-wit:

"This deed is made by the said parties of the first part and accepted by the said party of the second part upon the express condition, that the premises herein conveyed are to be used for a Public Park only, and for no other purposes, and if for any reason the said party of the second part, its successors or assigns, shall

at any time hereafter discontinue to use the said premises for Park purposes the title to the premises here conveyed shall immediately revert back to the grantors herein and to their heirs and assigns."

NOW THEREFORE, RESOLVED, That the said offer heretofore made and the said deed heretofore tendered be and the same are hereby accepted, and the City Clerk is hereby instructed to place said deed on record.

Approved August 13th, 1912. E. C. WELLIN, Mayor. Alderman Anderson offered the following resolution which was adopted by the following vote: "Ayes," 7; "Noes," none.

RESOLUTION. Be it resolved by the City Council of the City of Willmar that a warrant be issued against the general fund in favor of the Water and Light Commission in the sum of One Thousand Dollars to apply on the old water and light account.

Approved August 13, 1912. E. C. WELLIN, Mayor. The following applications for sewer permits for the following residence properties were presented: C. A. Nelson, lot 7 Block 63; C. J. Forsberg, lot 5 and south half of lot 4 Block 1 Hanson's Addition both for the Fourth street sewer; Alton Crosby, lot 1 and part of lot 2 Block 37 for the Tenth street sewer; G. J. Bjornberg for lot 7 Block 7, and lot 7 Block 8 both in Spicer's Addition and to connect with the Minnesota avenue trunk line, and Gust Johnson for lots 12, 13 and 14 Block 12 Spicer's Addition, and to connect with the Minnesota avenue trunk line.

The first three applications were granted subject to the sewer regulations. Mr. Crosby to pay no tapping fee as his property was formerly assessed for the sewer.

The applications of Bjornberg and Johnson were carried over to the next meeting.

It was authorized to spend not to exceed \$50.00 on the First Ward Poorhouse property, and the Finance Committee were to look after said improvement, and also to place Fire Insurance on said building.

The County Fair Association by Mr. W. O. Johnson, Secretary, asked for permission to use Seventh street north of R. R. tracks, part of Ella avenue and Nelson avenue in First Ward during Fair week. The request was granted.

Requisitions for supplies from the Water and Light Commission were presented and the Clerk was instructed to order the supplies.

On motion the Council adjourned to Monday evening, Aug. 19, 1912, at 8 o'clock p. m.
