DEVELOPMENT RALLY WILLMAR DEC. 13-14

Next Rally of West Central Minnesota Association at Willmar December 13 and 14.

Willmar will be the scene of a big booster meeting of the Western Minnesota Development Association on Friday and Saturday, Dec. 13 and 14. Mr. B. F. Woodard, executive secretary, from Wheaton, Minnesota, was here yesterday in consultation with the officers of the Willmar Commercial Club.

It is proposed to hold afternoon and evening sessions on Friday, the 13th and a morning session on the following day. Dean Woods of the Agricultural College; Prof. Holden of Ames, Iowa; Prof. E. C. Higbee, secretary of the Association, and the head of the Morris school; Hon. F. W. Murphy, president of Wheaton; and a number of others, are among the speakers who are certain to be here. BELL SUBSIDIARY SOLD UNDER HAMMER

Big Telephone Property Sold by Sheriff, Bonds Under Mortgage Foreclosure.

The Minnesota Central Telephone Company, once the pride of Western Minnesota, is no more. At least it has not the least bit of tangible property to its name. The last sad rites occurred at the Kandiyohi county courthouse last Friday morning, when all the property was sold to satisfy a trust deed held by the Minnesota Loan & Trust Company of Minneapolis, for about \$172,000. The property was bid in by the Northwestern Telephone Exchange Company for the sum of \$600,000, the difference being paid by securities held against the Minnesota Central by that company.

The act involving more than a half million dollars was over in a minute. Those present directly interested besides the sheriff were Atty. J. M. Martin, representing the Trust company, Mr. E. A. Prendergast, representing the Northwestern Telephone Exchange Company, General Manager Baker and Secretary Williams of the Minnesota Central.

Sheriff Bonde started to read the notice of sale, which was asked to be dispensed with by unanimous consent. Mr. Martin bid the amount of the mortgage on behalf of the Trust company. Mr. Prendergast bid \$600,000 on behalf of the Northwestern Telephone Exchange Co. The sheriff asked if there were any other bids. Mr. Prendergast with a smile looked into the outside room, remarking, "Where are the other fellows?" The hammer fell and the telephone system reaching twenty-three counties of Minnesota was sold. Mr. Prendergast handed to the sheriff over \$400,000 in notes given by the Minnesota Central to the Northwestern as payment for the difference between the amount called for by the mortgage and the amount of his bid. On one of these alone more than \$2,000 in interest was due.

Willmar was the headquarters for the Minnesota Central in the early days of building and promotion. After the Northwestern secured control of its stock, the general office was moved to Minneapolis in conjunction with the Northwestern Bell company. It has been extending the lines and improving the property as the large construction account shows. These facts were brought out in a suit brought by the minority stockholders to protect their interests, but which evidently did not materialize for their benefit. Last year the Minnesota Central did not pay the interest on the trust deed mortgage or bonds, the default of which led to the proceedings of last Friday.

Five Year's Record of Hospital.

The members of the staff with their families and the nurses associated with the Willmar Hospital celebrated the fifth anniversary of that institution by giving a banquet last Friday evening. An interesting report was given of the work done during the five years, up to Nov. 15. This report shows that in all 616 cases have been treated of which 414 were surgical; 186 medicine, and 16 obstetrical. The number of hospital days were 7,641. Of the surgical cases there were four deaths and of the medicine cases, 6 deaths, or ten in all. This shows a mortality of less than one per cent of the surgical cases and less than two per cent of all cases treated.
