### ANNUAL CREAMERY MEETING.

The annual meeting of the Lake Elizabeth creamery was held last Saturday afternoon and the following officers were elected: F. G. Nelson, president; J. A. Johnson, vice president; Fred Stenberg, secretary; J. G. Peterson, treasurer and A. T. Bjur, director for three years, to succeed Geo. Bowman. The association had a good year and the receipts including sales to patrons amounted to over \$22,000. 75,000 pounds of butter was made. A dividend of 8 per cent on all capital stock was declared. A gasoline engine was installed last fall to take the place of the steam engine. A new rule was also put into effect, whereby the patrons will get their butter at the same price as it nets when shipped. The old law, being to charge the same for butter sold to patrons as they received for butterfat. As the difference in butterfat and manufactured butter is at least 20 per cent the patrons were, on a high market, obliged to pay from 2 to 4 cents more for their butter than is netted when shipped.


