RE-APPORTIONMENT.

There will be no excuse for the present legislature not passing a fair re-apportionment bill. Re-apportionment is bound to hit Kandiyohi county, and take away the privilege we have enjoyed of having one senator and one representative of our own. Our people, however, believe in the square deal, and we cannot hope to keep a senator for ourselves with our population of 19,000 with the Eighth district having one senator for each 56,000 population and the Ninth district one for each 45,000. The change is bound to come. The Warner bill gives a senator for each 30,344 population in the Sixth and Seventh districts, and a representative for each 15,911 population. The bill joins Kandiyohi and Meeker county in one senatorial district, to be known as the 24th district with one representative from each county. Kandiyohi's population is 18,969 and Meeker's 17,022—making 35,991 combined or an overrun of 5,360 for the senator and 4,169 for the two representatives, which should almost entitle us to another representative. An attempt was made to join us with Swift county but our western neighbor thought we ought to take a partner more nearly our own size and fought the arrangement desperately.

Marble Pudding

2 cups sifted pastry flour; 2 level teaspoonfuls K C Baking Powder; 1 teaspoonful cinnamon; 1 teaspoonful salt; 3/4 cup sugar; 1/2 cup melted butter; 1 cup water; whites of 2 eggs, beaten dry; 1/2 ounce melted chocolate.

Sift together, three times, the flour, baking powder, salt and cinnamon. To the dry ingredients add the sugar, butter and water, and stir into the dry ingredients. Add the whites of the eggs. Divide the mixture into two parts and add the chocolate to one part. Dispose the two parts in a buttered mold to give a marbled appearance. Steam forty-five minutes.



Vanilla Sauce

Boil 2 cups of sugar and a cup of water six minutes; add 2 tablespoonfuls of butter and a teaspoonful of vanilla extract.


