DISTRICT COURT LASTS THREE DAYS

Peter Freeberg Was Acquitted of Charge of Assaulting Notorious Editor.

The Petit jury of Kandiyohi county this afternoon returned a verdict of "not guilty" in the case of State vs. Peter Freeberg in which C. F. Spencer was the complaining witness. The grand jury had returned an indictment for assault and battery and the case went on trial this morning. It continued until in the afternoon. The defense was conducted by Attorneys Tom Davis of Marshall and R. W. Stanford of Willmar and the prosecution was by County Attorney Ottersen. The proceedings were highly sensational and the courtroom was crowded to its full capacity. The jury was out only ten minutes.

The above was the only case on the criminal calendar. B. H. Chesley appeared before the court Monday and plead guilty to the charge of adultery and was assessed a fine of \$225, which was paid.

The grand jury was in session from Monday until noon today. The petit jury was dismissed from duty at close of Freeberg trial today.

The first case was that of State Bank of Fairfax vs. Peter Vlaar, Township of Holland and Town of Roseland. Spicer Land Co., intervenor. Each of the defendants were dismissed whereupon the intervenor withdrew and a stay in proceedings of 40 days was ordered by the judge.

The case of Ida M. Lien vs. Jacob J. Rivkin was settled and dismissed. The case of City of Willmar, appellant vs. Edmund D. Sykes, respondent, was continued until next term of court.

Case of City of Willmar vs. Andrew Bjorsell will be tried out of court, as will also case of City of Willmar vs. Thilda J. Wahlstrand.

In the case of Jay A. Pursley vs. Olive Peters Pursley et al, jury was instructed by court to render verdict giving Mrs. Pursley one-third of the amount sued for \$4,000, and each of the children of the late Alexander Pursley to share equally in the remaining two-thirds.

Case of Ole B. Glarum vs. Mary Glarum to be tried out of court.

Case of J. S. Olson et al, vs. E. W. Olson et al, was settled and dismissed.

Cases of Henning S. Nelson et al, vs. Hans A. Johnson, et al, and Henning S. Nelson vs. Ole A. Larson, et al, will be tried out of court.

Case of Union Elevator and Machinery Co. vs. J. H. Wiggins Company continued until next term of court on motion of plaintiff.

Case of A. E. Anderson et al, vs. W. F. Beardsley et al, is a court case. Henning E. Bomstad et al, vs. Geo. W. Wishard et al, will also be heard as a court case.

Olive Peters Pursley, appellant vs. Jay A. Pursley and James E. Pursley, respondents, a probate court appeal, was settled reversely to probate court order.

NOMINATING MASS CONVENTION AT BONDE HALL MAR. 29

Citizens Being Called to Meet a Week From Thursday Night to Name Candidates.

A call is being circulated for a mass convention and caucus of the citizens of Willmar to be held at the Bonde Hall Thursday evening, Mar. 27, for the purpose of nominating candidates to be voted upon at the city election to be held April 8.

There has been very little talk regarding available candidates for the general city offices. The office of assessor is vacant, owing to the death of the late G. C. Haines, and a successor must be chosen.

There will be five aldermen elected, and it appears that any or all of the four aldermen whose terms expire could have clear sailing for a renomination if they will consent to serve another term. There is a vacancy in Third ward caused by the removal of Alderman G. A. Erickson into Fourth ward, so that there will be two candidates required in that precinct.

The last day for filing names of candidates on the city ticket is Saturday, Mar. 29.

New Building a Very Handsome Structure and a Credit to the City.

The new city hall will be formally opened next Monday evening, Mar. 24, when the City Council holds its first meeting there. The hall will be open for inspection to the public from seven to eight o'clock before the Council meeting. City Clerk Gunderson and Secretary Fridlund of the Water & Light Department moved into their new offices in the city hall during the past week.

The citizens will be agreeably surprised on their first visit to this building. It is a credit to the city. The ground floor is used for fire apparatus. The entrance to the upper floor is on Sixth street on the south end of the building. The Water & Light Department has the two first rooms on the left on the second floor. Then one comes to the City Clerk's office and passes into the municipal court room and council chamber. On the right are the fireproof vault, toilet rooms, Chief of Police headquarters and fireman's hall. The latter may be connected with the municipal courtroom by folding doors. The rooms are nicely finished and have fine electric fixtures. The furniture was purchased by the firemen for the money realized from their last ball.

The fire company will be present at the opening next Monday night.
