### HALF OF BOARD TO BE ELECTED

#### Three Members of Board of Education to Be Chosen Saturday.

The resignation of President Russell Spicer from the Board of Education leaves three members of the Board to be elected at next Saturday evening's school meeting. Those whose terms expire are Dr. B. J. Branton and J. F. Millard. The members who hold over are P. C. Peterson, Rev. Carl E. Oberg and A. O. Forsberg. Instead of there being only one-third of the board to fill, Mr. Spicer's resignation makes it one-half. Therefore it is possible that a controlling contingent might be elected next Saturday who would reshape the destinies of the public schools next year.

There is a contingent of our people who have never acquiesced in the action of the Board in establishing departments of Agriculture, Domestic Science and Manual Training, and who believe that the space used for these subjects might be utilized to take care of the overflowing grade rooms. We doubt whether there are many who really favor so radical a move, but that is the way they talk. Everyone interested in the welfare of our schools ought to show that interest Saturday night by being present at the school meeting.

Mr. Russell Spicer's resignation was quite unexpected. When interviewed by the Willmar Tribune Mr. Spicer said that his resignation was not caused by any friction among the members of the Board nor by reason of any criticism of the work of the Board, but was due entirely to business matters which will take him away from the city a good share of next year and which he felt would make it impossible to devote the necessary time to school affairs.

Mr. Spicer has served on the Board of Education for eight years, he having one year more to serve on his third term.

The Willmar singers will furnish the program and the local society the ice cream, coffee, etc. All for the price of 25 cents. A good enjoyable time is assured.




