UNIQUE AFFAIR AT STOCKHOLM

Fiddlers From Sweden, Norway and Finland Participate in Musical Contest—Leading Cattle Expert of Denmark in the United States to Study Agricultural Conditions—Government of Norway Pushing a Bill for Compulsory Arbitration.

The celebrated portrait painter, Anders Zorn, arranged a contest by fiddlers from the Scandinavian countries in Stockholm June 27. Fiddlers from Sweden, Norway and Finland participated. As in past years Anders Zorn paid the traveling expenses of the contesting fiddlers and a salary for the day the meeting was held. It was the first time that representatives of "folk-musik" in the three northern countries had an opportunity to come together and it proved a mighty interesting feature.

The royal family of Sweden has been sued by the retiring former land-tingsman, Johansson, who is asking the municipal court of Stockholm to order the royal family to turn over to him several million crowns, which, he says, had belonged to Helga de la Brache, nee Aurora Magnusson.

The directors of the Carnegie Foundation in Stockholm have resolved to honor the following persons, who have distinguished themselves by heroic acts: Maria Hessel, in Bergsjö parish; P. O. Aman and Fisherman F. Nordgren, L. Nilsson and E. Augustsson; Signe Liedon, Alfhild Liedon and A. T. Danielson. All had saved people from drowning and have in recognition thereof received watches and cups with inscriptions.

King Gustaf has appointed the painter, Baron Cederstrom, and the engraver, Erik Lindberg, to represent Sweden at the International Artists' congress at Ghent. The school inspector, J. L. Bager-Sjogren, and the schoolteacher, Gustaf Bergh, have been appointed delegates to the International Congress for School Hygiene at Buffalo, N. Y.

A most unique collection of stamps was shown by Andron of Lexington, Mo., at a recent meeting of the Swedish Filatelists' association in Stockholm. Mr. Andron's collection includes all stamps that have been issued by the United States and is regarded as one of the most valuable stamp collections in the world.

At the Schoolteachers' seminary in Stockholm the Countess Viveka Hamilton, the youngest daughter of the governor of Gafle, Count Hugo Hamilton, recently passed the examinations for teacher in the public schools. It is something unusual that a countess in Sweden will take to the teacher's profession.

The L. M. Ericsson telephone company of Stockholm had an extra meeting of its shareholders June 30, when it was decided to increase the capital stock of the company to 6,800,000 crowns. This concern is the largest telephone company in the world and is renowned for its excellent work.

The Chalmers institute in Gothenburg has accepted the resignation of its president, Professor Wikander, who will be succeeded by Professor B. H. Grauers. Such appointments are always made by the king direct.

A football contest was held June 8 between representatives of Sweden and Norway. The Swedes won by a score of 9 to 0. The contest was held in Stockholm and was witnessed by a large number of people.

The Gustavus Adolphus society will have its annual convention at Kiel, on the Baltic, in the midweek of September.

Denmark. Baking Powder Biscuits Light as a Feather By Mrs. Janet McKenzie Hill, Editor of the Boston Cooking School Magazine

Baking Powder Biscuits made by this recipe are so far ahead of ordinary baking powder biscuits that, if once tried, you will never use any other recipe. Try it the next time you run short of bread. Save this recipe.

Three cups flour; 1/2 to 3/4 cup shortening; 1/2 cup milk; 1/2 cup baking powder; about 1 cup milk or water; 1 teaspoonful salt.

Sift three times, the flour, salt and baking powder. Work into the flour the shortening, using lard or butter for shortening. Then mix to a very soft dough with the milk. The softer the biscuit enters the oven, the lighter it comes out. Never knead baking powder biscuits; cut the dough into shape and roll lightly. Cut in small shapes and bake on a very shallow pan in a hot oven. In placing biscuits in the pans place well apart, not allowing edges to touch. Small biscuits are better than large ones. Large biscuits do not have the proper amount of time to raise and bake.
