EVERYBODY TO SING

Unique Gathering at Anoka Court House Yard. Everybody Invited to Sing.

The Anoka Union published the following announcement, which certainly is a unique plan to get the people of a town together:

"Friday evening, August 2 there will be an evening with the old songs in the court house yard. Everybody is invited to come and help, no matter whether you can carry a tune or not. The Anoka band will be there to furnish the accompaniments. T. P. Giddings will lead and the whole audience is requested to join in and sing the old songs everyone knows. There will be college songs, folk songs and patriotic tunes. The words will be printed and circulated so that every one will have them. Lights will be strung so that all can see and a good social evening will be enjoyed, weather permitting.

"People who attended the Olympic games at Stockholm last year said that the wonderful thing about the meeting was not the games but the singing of the crowds. The great stadium, holding nearly a hundred thousand people, rang with the folk songs of the Scandinavians. It is well known that the European nations sing, especially the Scandinavians and Germans. They have a wealth of songs which every one knows. At every meeting at these Olympic games these songs would start from different parts of the crowd and swell into a mighty chorus that made the Americans marvel. "For the first time in the history of politics last year there was singing at a national convention. At the Bull Moose convention there was for a part of the program every day singing by the crowd. It was a wonderful thing to hear.

"A wave of singing is at last sweeping over this country. Every one likes to sing even if he cannot sing well. At the park concerts recently given in the Minneapolis parks 15,000 people crowded around the band stand and lifted up their voices in song. Through the generosity of the County Commissioners the court house yard will be used and this beautiful spot will ring with "Swanee River," "Dixie," "Seeing Nellie Home," "Star Spangled Banner," and other old favorites.

"You are invited to be present and to take part. The affair is free to all."

As a means of getting all the people together to touch elbows and thus tend to bring the different groups closer together in community interests the above plan appeals to us.
