### CERTIFICATE OF INCORPORATION

**Of the Kandiyohi County Fair Association.**  
We, the undersigned, for the purpose of forming a corporation under and pursuant to the provisions of Chapter Fifty-eight (58), Revised Laws of Minnesota for 1905, and any amendments thereto, do hereby associate ourselves as a body corporate, and do hereby adopt the following Certificate of Incorporation:

**ARTICLE I.** The name of this corporation shall be "Kandiyohi County Fair Association."

**ARTICLE II.** The general nature of its business shall be to conduct and hold county fairs in and for the County of Kandiyohi and State of Minnesota, and to that end to acquire grounds upon which the association might hold such fairs, and to transmit any other business connected therewith and pertaining thereto.

**ARTICLE III.** The principal place of business of this corporation shall be in the City of Willmar, Kandiyohi County, Minnesota.

**ARTICLE IV.** The time for the commencement of this corporation shall be August 15th A. D. 1913, and the period of its duration shall be thirty years.

**ARTICLE V.** The names and places of residence of the persons forming this corporation are Peter Bonde of Willmar, Minnesota; Ed. Benson of Willmar, Minnesota; John Wicklund of Atwater, Minnesota; John Ahlstrom of Spicer, Minnesota; John Swenson of Willmar, Minnesota; J. S. Anderson of Atwater, Minnesota; E. C. Wells of Willmar, Minnesota; O. R. Berkness of Willmar, Minnesota; P. M. Burns of Kandiyohi, Minnesota; Wm. O. Johnson of Willmar, Minnesota; O. R. Berkness of Willmar, Minnesota.
