ORDINANCE NO. 129. An Ordinance Relating to the Sewers of the City of Willmar and Establishing Fees or Charges and Rules and Regulations for the Tapping or Connecting Therewith, and Providing Penalties for the Violation Thereof.

Be it ordained by the City of Willmar as follows:

Section 1—No person shall hereafter tap or connect, either directly or indirectly, with any sewer within the limits of the City of Willmar, without first having obtained permission therefrom from the City Council of said City, and had a permit therefor, under the hand and seal of the City Clerk of said City issued for such tapping or connection, nor shall any person so tap or connect, either directly or indirectly, without first having paid to the City Clerk the fee or charge hereinafter fixed and established.

Section 2—No person having a connection with any sewer in the City of Willmar, from any lot or from any building of any kind, shall connect therewith from any other lot or building whatsoever, owned or controlled by him, without first having obtained permission from the City Council and a permit from the City Clerk as hereinbefore provided, nor shall any person, having connection with any sewer as aforesaid, allow, suffer or permit any other person to connect therewith from any lot or from any building of whatsoever name or nature, owned or controlled by such other person, unless such other person shall have first obtained permission from the City Council and a permit from the City Clerk as in this ordinance provided.

Section 3—The fee or charge of the sum of \$50.00 is hereby fixed and established for the tapping or connecting, either directly or indirectly, with any sewer within the limits of the City of Willmar, which fee shall be paid in advance to the City Clerk before the issuance of a permit for such tapping or connection.

Said fee or charge shall be paid for each and every such tapping or connection from each and every lot and from each and every house, dwelling, residence, outhouse, barn, store, hotel or building of whatsoever name or nature and whether the same be made directly or indirectly or through or by means of the connection, with said sewer, of any other lot or house, dwelling, residence, outhouse, barn, store, hotel or other building; provided however, that when more than one building, other than dwellings or residences, is situated on any lot, piece or parcel of land, a connection from such buildings shall be considered as only one connection and only one charge of \$50.00 shall be made therefor; and provided further, that the provisions of this ordinance as to the payment of a fee or charge shall not apply to any lot, piece or parcel of land or to

any building of any kind which is situated on any lot, piece or parcel of land which has previously been assessed for the building and construction of the sewer which is sought to be tapped or connected with, unless said assessment shall not have been paid.

Section 4—No person shall tap into or make a connection with any sewer within the limits of the City of Willmar unless the sewer pipes used in making such connection shall be standard salt glazed, vitrified clay pipe of first quality, sound and well burned throughout their thickness, impervious to moisture, and free from cracks, flaws or other imperfections; nor shall such connection be made unless all joints in the pipe used shall be cemented thoroughly, so as to prevent leaks, with cement mortar composed of one part by measure of the best quality of American Portland cement mixed with one part of clean, sharp sand, properly mixed and tempered with sufficient water to form a stiff paste, which shall be applied before the same begins to set.

Section 5—The City Clerk of the City of Willmar is hereby forbidden to issue any permit to tap or connect, either directly or indirectly, with any sewer, unless the City Council shall first have granted permission therefor, nor unless the fee or charge, herein fixed and established, shall first have been paid.

Section 6—All tapping fees collected under this ordinance shall be distributed as follows: Seventy-five (75) per cent thereof shall be credited to the Sinking Fund of said City and Twenty-five (25) per cent thereof shall be credited to the General Fund of said City.

Section 7—Any person who shall violate any provision of this ordinance shall, upon conviction thereof before the Municipal Court of said City, or before any Court having jurisdiction, be punished by a fine of not less than \$50.00 nor more than \$100.00, together with the costs of prosecution, or by imprisonment for not less than thirty nor more than ninety days.

Section 8—All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 9—This ordinance, shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication.
