CITY COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Council Chambers, City Hall Building, Willmar, Minn., Sept. 1, 1913. Adjourned meeting of the City Council with Mayor Wellin in the chair.

The following members of the Council were present on roll call: Mayor Wellin, Aldermen Johnson, Anderson, Hedin, Tjosvold Sperry, Freeberg and Norman, 8; absent, Alderman Larson, 1.

City Attorney Stanford also was present.

A. J. Ekander appeared and asked for permission to change over sewer connection for his residence on Lot 14, Block 45 to the new Third Street sewer, which matter was brot up at the last meeting. The request was granted.

Moved and seconded that the motion adopted at meeting held August 25th, 1913, with reference to said sewer tap be and the same is hereby rescinded.

Nels Magnuson appeared and asked for permission to add an extension on the Trott avenue sewer between Jessie Street and First street, now being built by E. A. Erickson. No action was taken in the matter.

J. W. Johnson appeared and spoke about having the East Litchfield Avenue sewer extended east from Bertha street. No action was taken in the matter.

A communication from the Library Board was presented advising that said Board had acted on bids for heating Library building, referred to them at the last meeting, and recommended that bid of J. H. Wiggins Co., for \$1,330, be accepted.

The matter was on motion carried over until next meeting.

J. W. Johnson appeared with reference to sewer extensions on East Litchfield avenue.

Moved and seconded that Wm. Thompson be summoned to appear at the next meeting and explain how he came to have sewer connection with Ferring's drain tile. Carried.

Engineer Rowat reported on the matter of sewer extensions ordered at a former meeting.

J. C. Strand made application to connect his residence property situate on lots 4 and 5 of Block "E", First Addition, with the First street sewer and A. S. Johnson made application to connect his residence property on lot 8, of Block 67 with the Second street sewer. The said applications were granted, subject to sewer regulations and upon payment of the tapping fee.

Requisitions for supplies from the Water & Light Commission were presented and the Clerk was instructed to order same.

On motion the Council adjourned.
