HUB HOTEL BUILDING ON FIRE

Dale Grocery Store is Guted by Fire Last Tuesday Morning.

The M. B. Dale grocery store, (Joe Dale, manager), which is located in what is known as the old Hub Hotel building on Third street, was completely gutted by fire last Monday night.

About 1 o'clock in the morning one of the occupants of the apartments above the store, Dr. Wanner, was awakened by smoke and fire coming up thru a hole burned thru the floor. The occupants of the different rooms were hurriedly aroused and the fire alarm sent in. The fire department made prompt response and succeeded in saving the building. The Dale grocery stock, both in the basement and in the store was completely destroyed. The fire seems to have started in the basement but its origin is not known. Mr. Dale had been testing eggs by aid of a small kerosene lamp during the day and believes he may have forgotten to extinguish the light. Another conjecture is that a lighted cigar stump may have been thrown by a passer-by into the basement window.

We understand that the insurance on the stock was \$1,800, and on fixtures \$1,200. Mr. Dale's loss will be total while that on the building will be probably about \$1,000, though no adjustment of the losses have yet been made by the insurance companies.

The L. A. Tjosvold Music Company's storeroom in the same building was not hurt by fire but the loss by smoke was fixed at \$500.

"Red Cross" Makes Good.

All Night Service at P. O.

A great improvement in the Willmar mail service will take effect Oct. 1. A twenty-four hour service at the postoffice will then take effect. Anyone who has a postoffice box can secure the mail up to midnight or after five in the morning. The mails will also be made up at the postoffice for all the outgoing night mails a short time before time for the train to leave. This will be better than depending upon the mail boxes at the depot.

Barn Burned Saturday.

The fine new barn on the Joseph Isaacson farm in the town of Kandiyohi was burned down last Saturday. The origin of the flames is not known. The barn was a new structure built last year. Several tons of hay in the barn were burned with the building.

OBITUARY

MRS. (SANDSTAD) JÖRAAS.

News has been received by Spicer people, from Santa Cruz, Calif., of the death of Mrs. Anna Jöraas which occurred August 26th, 1913. Mrs. Jöraas will be remembered by many friends and neighbors, from the time the family lived on their farm about two miles south-west of Spicer. They came here from Trondhjem in 1884. They left for Sacramento, Calif., in 1888. Mr. and Mrs. Johannes Jöraas celebrated their golden wedding, August 26th, 1905. In the following year August 8th, Mr. Jöraas died, and since that time the widow has made her home with a daughter living near Santa Cruz. Mrs. Anna (Sandstad) Jöraas was born near Trondhjem, Norway, Sept 25th, 1831.

The remains were brought to Sacramento and laid to rest by the side of her husband.

Two sons and six daughters with their families and a number of other relatives are left to mourn her.

She was a true Christian and a very talented lady and of a bright disposition, highly esteemed by her many friends. Blessed be her memory. —Contributed.
